

MACKINAW TROUT IN ODELL REFUSE TO SEE CALLERS

You corner an inhabitant of the fall timber in the high Cascades and you ask him if there are fish in the mountain lakes. You expect an answer, but sometimes it surprises you. For he may tell you of the time Douglas Hunk Finn fished the mountain lake for the Mackinaw trout. And the lake was so deep Hunk tore down the Bend-Eugene telephone line so he could fish deep enough. And the fish was so big Hunk had to hook his line onto a steam donkey and it took him three days to haul that fish to the surface.

You may believe him and you may not, but Chet Good, fisherman and salesman for the Brown Motor company, knows there are Mackinaw trout in Odell lake and while they may not be as big as Hunk's fish they are plenty big and he hunkered to land one to show the boys at home. So Chet, with Gilbert C. Wilcox and a Register-Guard reporter climbed into Chet's Terraplane at 5 o'clock Sunday morning and drove to Odell lake where lie the Mackinaw trout, so deep that some of the natives on the lake have never seen one of them.

The largest Mackinaw trout recorded to have been caught from Odell lake weighed 30 pounds and the man who caught it hooked it just as he put a cigar in his mouth. When he landed the fish, his cigar was about an inch long and he never lighted it up and swallowed it or what happened. This spring a woman landed a 25-pound Mackinaw in the east end of the lake and it was for that spot the Eugene party headed.

As a side issue, Chet hoped to drive his Terraplane from Eugene to the lake in high gear, a feat considered by natives of the Oakridge and Westfir country to be impossible. In fact, they were willing to bet at almost any odds, but after seeing demonstrations here, they pared their bets down to even money.

To warm up the car, the trip to Oakridge was broken off in just 45 minutes. The 70 miles to Odell lake took just under three hours from the time the party left Eugene.

Striking the mountain road past McCredie springs into the lake, the Terraplane paid no more attention to grades and hills than a mountain mosquito does to an anemic tourist, taking those long, steep grades with ease and plenty of reserve power to pick up speed if desired.

At one terrific switch-back the long car was unable to make the turn, but Chet backed up, started in high gear from a dead stop, and continued up the hill in high.

But there was one spot the natives had indicated would stop anything short of a free-wheeling jack-rabbit powered with a Wasp motor and that was a switch-back just west of Abernathy. It is the steepest part of the road and was made more difficult by loose rock at the turn.

Taking this turn with all possible speed, the Terraplane went to within ten feet of the top of the hill before it died, unable to make that last ten feet in high gear.

Determined to give it another try, Chet unloaded the car, backed down the grade and took another run at that switch-back. And take credence in our assertion, he was driving those 94 horses 'round the mountain when he came, but the skid in the loose gravel lost his momentum and again the car stopped, ten feet short of the top of the grade.

It was the only spot on the entire road the car failed to negotiate in high gear.

Arriving at Odell lake, the party engaged a motor boat and started out after the Mackinaw trout. Good, doing the fishing, had prepared for the venture by getting together 900 feet of fishing line, a five-inch spoon and a deep-sea fishing rod. While Wilcox caught small trout and white fish for bait, Chet sunk his outfit as far down as possible, the wind taking the boat slowly across the lake from the southwestern point toward the north-east end.

Odell lake at this point is 2200 feet deep and the Mackinaw trout lie far down in the dark depths of the water. With a six-inch trout on the hook, 800 feet deep, the lake was patrolled for the elusive Mackinaw, but nary a nibble was felt. Each time the line was pulled in, the poor little bait fish was found dead, unable to stand the pressure of the terrific depth.

For three hours the lake was pat-

MILK SITUATION DUE IN COUNCIL

Eugene's milk situation again was expected to confront the Eugene city council at the meeting at city hall Monday night when petitions urging that milk producers outside the city limits be allowed to pasteurize milk and be presented and the report of J. D. Mickie, state dairy and food commissioner, considered.

The petition seeking permission to pasteurize milk outside the city limits has been circulated here by E. S. Fish and was signed by virtually all outside producer-distributors. Fish said Saturday he expected to present the petition at the council meeting Monday, but he could not be reached Monday for further confirmation.

Mr. Mickie, who recently conducted a survey of milk producers in this district which resulted in degrading of many dairies, was to be in Eugene Monday afternoon for a meeting with the health committee of the city council and Dr. H. G. Helterline, city milk inspector, according to E. W. Zumbalt. It was presumed that Mickie's report would be considered with the possibility of it being presented to the city council Monday night. What action, if any, would be taken was uncertain.

The report indicated that a higher standard should be maintained in many local dairies if they continued to advertise Grade A raw milk.

The Eugene Building congress committee on public works, headed by A. L. Williamson, will appear before the council to submit the recommendations on public works here, as adopted at a recent meeting of the group. The group recommended that the city seek federal funds for the construction of a city natatorium, the reconstruction of main trunk sewers, a sewage disposal plant and possibly a new city hall. Members of the committee are Williamson, W. W. Harcombe and E. G. Harlan.

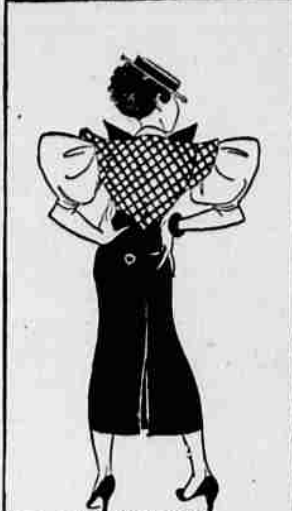
