Hiram Leander Mounts
Hiram Leander Mounts died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Frank Bailey, route 2, Tuesday morning following an illness of three years.
Mr. Mounts was born March 16, 1857, at Lorane. When he was 14 he moved to Junction City. On December 23, 1888, he married Della T. Beck of Eugene, who died December 23, 1925. Of their eight children six survive: Mrs. Retha Shelley, Mrs. Goldie Keeler, Mrs. Arla Cury, all of Portland; Edgar and Jess Mounts of Franklin; Mrs. Anna Bailey of Springfield. Six grandchildren and several half-brothers and half-sisters also survive.
Funeral services will be held Thursday at 2 p. m. at the Franklin Methodist church, Rev. Dean C. Poindester, pastor of the Springfield Methodist church, officiating. Interment will be in the Franklin cemetery.

3-C Men Get Taste Of Fire Fighting In Bend District
The men of the civilian conservation corps have undergone their "baptism of fire" and have proved themselves worthy fire fighters, according to Major Charles H. Corlett, district commander, who returned recently from a trip to the camps near Bend.
When fire broke out in the Davis lake country a few days ago, 3-C men from the Crane Prairie and Sisters camps were called into action. The Sisters camp is manned by Oregon and Washington men but the Crane Prairie outfit is made up of men from Kansas. It was interesting to note that the Kansas boys proved just as proficient fire fighters as the men raised in the forest states, Corlett said.
The fire started on the Moore creek trail and was safely controlled after burning over about 100 acres. Approximately 300 of the C. C. C. recruits were called to the fire lines when the blaze threatened to spread farther into the area of dead and matted jackpines.
Forest service men were profuse in their commendation of the work of the men in trenching and holding the fire, fanned by a stiff northeast wind. Although inexperienced except for the instructions given them at camp, the boys vigorously attacked the blaze on all fronts.
They were first called in the evening and the camp officers asked for volunteers. The boys stepped forward to a man and the officers loaded them on trucks and before long the camp had taken on a wartime appearance as the cavalcade moved off towards the fire front.
Coffee and sandwiches were served during the small hours of the morning and before the day had dawned the fire was controlled by substantial trenches. Because of the presence of much fallen timber, motorized trenching equipment was of little value.
As ranger of the Crescent district, R. C. Burgess was officially in charge of the control work, but Carl B. Neal, Deschutes supervisor, was also in the field. Both Burgess and Neal expressed their satisfaction at the manner in which the 3-C men conducted themselves in fighting the fire.

Obsidian Trip Is Planned This Week

Early Sunday morning the group will leave camp and hike to the mines which will be explored before continuing on to Gold hill. A fine view of the Cascade country may be obtained from this peak, it was said.
