News From 3-C Camp Is Reported

The weekly news letter issued at Camp Kerby of the 3-C at Selma announces that two sub-camps are being established. One was set at Woods creek, two miles south of Waldo and the second will be established the coming Monday at Swede basin, 15 miles northwest of the main camp. Each camp has 35 men doing construction and maintenance work.

The news notes also report that a free barber service has been arranged in camp, a barber school graduate being instructed to give two hair cuts per month.

There evenings of boxing have been presented at the camp and a camp tournament is to be held soon to determine winners to enter the conference meet.

MELROSE 3-C CAMP HAS FLAG-RAISING

An impressive flag-raising ceremony was held at the Melrose C. C. camp this week with army and forest service officials and prominent Roseburg citizens taking part, according to Major Charles H. Corlett, commander of the Eugene district, who returned Wednesday from an inspection trip.

The Melrose camp is manned by Nebraska men and is located west of Roseburg. Major Charles E. Speer, camp commander, served as master of ceremonies for the flag raising. Capt. Gottfried W. Sperry gave an address on the flag.

Newell Wright, supervisor of the O. and C. camps, Mr. Simpson, his assistant, and Mr. Derby, camp superintendent, also spoke. The mayor of Roseburg and other dignitaries were present.

Major Corlett also spoke and complimented the forest service for its splendid cooperation in the 3-C program at Melrose. Corlett reported the establishment of a waiting room in Roseburg, donated by the Kiwanis club. It provides rest accommodations for C. C. C. men awaiting busses in the city.

A shelter and mess hall for a small detachment has been provided in Roseburg by the chamber of commerce and the American legion. It provides accommodations for a group of men who remain in Roseburg to handle shipments of supplies for the camps. All civic organizations in the city have proved willing to cooperate to the fullest extent with the civilian conservation corps program, Corlett said.

Fruit Growers to End Fresh Cherries

The Eugene Fruit Growers' association is still packing fresh cherries, planning to send out two more cars this week, one going Thursday evening. Three cars have been sent east already.

The plant is finishing up on the sweet cherries this week and the sour will be coming in next week.

A few beets came in this week, but the plant will not be running on them in any quantity until next week. For a time now the plant will run only twice or three times a week until the next big crops come on. Beans will not be on for another week or 10 days yet.
