WINNER TO PLAY FOR STATE TITLE AT KLAMATH FALLS

The Eugene Legion juniors will meet the Marshfield juniors for the district baseball championship here Sunday afternoon. The game, scheduled after days of negotiations, will follow the Eugene-Albany game at the fairgrounds.

Marshfield won the southwestern Oregon title by beating Medford last Sunday, 6 to 5. Marshfield will probably use the same lineup against Eugene.

Frank Strong, commander of the American Legion post here, is in charge of arrangements for Sunday's game. The winner will represent this district at the state baseball championship meet in Klamath Falls, Eugene was runner-up for the state title last year.

Ray Murray, manager of the Eugene juniors, has been negotiating with Marshfield for several days. Marshfield wanted to take the game to the coast, but Murray insisted on bringing it here. A three-game series was contemplated, but it was decided to shoot the works on one game.

Danner To Start

Ford Danner, Eugene high student, will start in the pitcher's box for Eugene. Varelman will perform behind the bat with Michaels at first, Cox on second, Dunn at third and Phillips at short. Walls will play left field with Brown in center field and McIntyre in right field.

The Eugene-Marshfield juniors game will follow the Townies game at the fairgrounds. Separate admission prices will be charged. Details will be announced later.

One of the leading hitters in the league is Wilkinson, Albany's catcher and infielder, and against Eugene in their last game, was largely responsible for the victory over the Townies.

A track and field meet for the members of the Civilian Conservation Corps in the Eugene district is being planned and Fritz Kramer, Eugene high school coach, has accepted the chairmanship of the event. Because of the difficulties involved in bringing entrants for all events from the 22 camps in the district, it is planned to stage the meet over a series of week-ends, taking only one or two events each week.

The first meet will be held Sunday, Aug. 6, with the 100 yard dash and 220 yard dash on the program. Each company will be asked to send in one man for each event and as several heats will be required, a good little program of dashes will be staged. The purpose of the meet is to find the district champion in each event.

On Aug. 13 the 440 yard dash will be staged and on the following Sunday, Aug. 20, the half-mile race will be run. The running broad jump will be staged Aug. 27 and the running high jump on Sept. 3. Each of the little meets will start at 2:30 o'clock.

Hugh E. Rosson, graduate manager of the University of Oregon, has generously offered the use of Hayward field for the meets and will also permit the 3-C athletes to use the other athletic equipment on hand while the meets are held, staged. Few of the men have their track shoes with them and the use of the Webfoot shoes will help.

Elimination contests will be held in each camp to determine the company champions and the winners will come into Eugene on the ration trucks on the last track into Eugene prior to the meet. They will be fed and housed at Camp Skinner back of the butte.

Looking down in the ball bucket you couldn't distinguish Frederick, as we later named him, from his croaking brothers.

It was not, in fact, until I grabbed him by the hind legs, slipped a No. 5 snelled hook through his lips and cast him out across the waters of the lake that I knew he was different. Now, 900 out of a thousand frogs used as black bass bait will, when they hit the water on the end of a line, kick once or twice and then come peacefully fold their legs and wait for their weight and that of the sinker to carry them to the bottom. As you know it would be much better for the fisherman if they'd create a disturbance for the way bass won't be fooled by anything that doesn't appear to be alive.

As I said, it was when Frederick hit the water that I knew I had found a frog of frogs. As the first splash caught him in the eyes he was off—off like Dempsey in the first round at Toledo, Post from Moscow, Paddock at the sound of the starter's gun. In one magnificent, breath-taking power dive that bent the rod double, he was off for the bottom.

SENATORS SCORE 3 TO 2 VICTORY OVER NEW YORK

The Washington Senators have drawn first blood in their highly important series with the New York Yankees and boosted their American league lead to two games.

The Senators traveled ten innings to gain their eighth victory in eleven meetings with the Yanks by a 3-2 count yesterday as a pinch hit by Cliff Bolton, third string catcher, drove in the deciding run.

New York's national league contender, the Giants, increased their lead to five games, with Carl Hubbell pitching four-hit ball for his eighth shutout and the Giants' 17th and driving in the first run himself. The Giants beat the Brooklyn Dodgers for the fourth time, 2 to 0.

The third place Pittsburgh Pirates meanwhile took their third straight fall out of the Chicago Cubs, 2 to 1, behind their six hit hurling of Larry French, and cut the Cubs' second place margin to a half game.

The St. Louis Cardinals reasserted their right to fourth place scoring two runs in the ninth by Martin, Watkins, Frisch and Crawford to beat the Cincinnati Reds 4 to 3 while Boston dropped two games to the Phillies. The Phils won on home runs as Harry McCurdy cracked a pinch homer for the winning runs in the opening 4-3 victory and Wes Schumacher, former Oregon Stater, scored one in the second game to win 2-1 as Ben Cantwell gave the winners only two hits.

Cleveland, aided by Monte Pearson's five hit flinging, moved into fourth place in the American league by walling six hits for the Chicago White Sox 9 to 1 while the Detroit Tigers dropped a 12-inning slugfest match to St. Louis 10 to 9 on Oscar Melillo's single and Jim Levey's double.

Chicago's defeat, the eighth straight, left the pale horse only a half game out of seventh place as the Boston Red Sox defeated the Philadelphia Athletics 6-2 despite Jimmy Fox's 20th homer.
