

JAPANESE WORRIED BY U. S. ACTIVITY IN FUKIEN REGION

TOKYO, July 28.—(AP)—Japanese consuls in Fochow and other parts of China informed the foreign office today of various rumors that Americans are seeking a foothold in Fukien, a maritime province in southeast China proper.

A foreign office spokesman said the consuls are investigating the reports especially because "Japan is very sensitive" regarding the possibility of foreign influence being established in Fukien, opposite Japan's colony of Formosa, which might be menaced thereby.

He added that his office placed little credence in the rumors and until they are confirmed no action is contemplated.

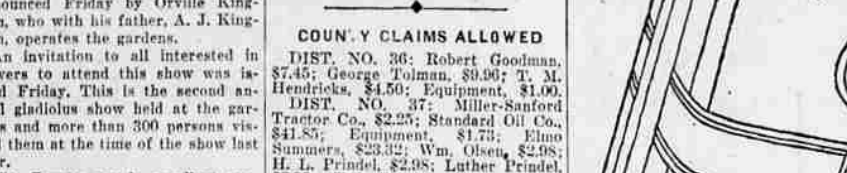
The code they presented was designed to be applicable for all their own and other retailers subject to slight differentials proposed for each line.
