ON July 28.—(P)—The Com. Bulletin will say tomorrow: The wool market has been a recently good one in wool this week, all the market has been spotty, prices getting little or no business. Prices are firm to slightly higher especially on medium comb-wool.

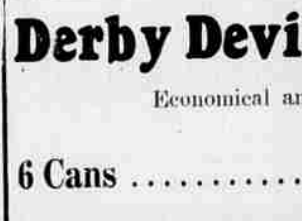
