

PORTLAND BEAVERS IN SECOND PLACE IN COAST LEAGUE

Gene Lillard's third basing and timely hitting are important reasons for the fourth place position of Los Angeles today two games behind Sacramento in the battle for the Coast League championship.

The Angel infielder clubbed a ninth inning home run with one man on base last night to give Los Angeles a 5-3 win over the Senators and a 5-1 lead in the series. Sanders relieved Horne in the Sacramento box at the end of the eighth and was charged with the defeat. Henry Steinacker's four-bagger and single accounted for two of the three Solon tallies.

After dropping three in a row, Oakland came back to nose out San Francisco, 5-4. Two errors by Shortstop Carl Sever and Bruce Cunningham's wild pitch helped the Oaks to three unearned runs. Roy Joiner held the Seals to eight blows.

CLEVELAND TEAM DEFEATS DETROIT

NEW YORK, July 29.—(AP)—The Cleveland Indians, who got off to a slow start under their new manager, Walter Johnson, are clicking now and threaten to finish the American league race in third place, a notch above the berth they occupied for the last four years.

Yesterday's 7 to 2 victory over Detroit placed the Indians just one game behind the third-place Philadelphia Athletics. It was one of the two contests played in the major leagues yesterday, the schedules and bad weather keeping other clubs idle.

Chuck Klein became the major league's leading wallflower of two-baggers when he smacked out a double, with two mates aboard, in the 10th to give the Phillies a 13 to 12 win over Boston's Braves. Before this blow Chick was tied for two-bagger honors with Irving Burns of the St. Louis Browns, at 30 each.

It was a free-hitting contest, in which the Phils hammered Frank-home and Brandt for 29 safeties, including homers by Wes Schulmerich and Don Hurst, while Boston found Rhem, Jackson, Liska and Moore for 19, including four-baggers by Randy Moore and Wally Berger. The latter tied Chuck Klein for National league home run honors at 18 each.

Stanfield Accepts Appointment For Public Works Job

ONTARIO, Ore., July 29.—(AP)—Robert N. Stanfield, former United States senator and a large eastern Oregon wool operator, will accept his appointment as one of the three Oregon advisers for the administration of the public works program in Oregon.

"I am not familiar with the law," Stanfield said here, "and I am not looking for a job that will take me away from my business which at this time requires a great deal of attention."

"However, if I can be of service in this connection I will be glad to do so. If I find that I cannot do the work justice, I can resign, I presume, so I shall accept the appointment and hope to be of service in getting the work started in Oregon."

The former senator was in Ontario today on business, and on Monday night will address a mass meeting of Ontario business men on the national recovery administration program. His headquarters are in Baker.

steadily. Definite figures as to the numbers were meager because many postmasters had failed to count the return envelopes.

Bearing the proposed code for the automobile industry employing thousands of men, Hugh S. Johnson, the administrator of national recovery, returned to his desk today from the middle west and plunged immediately into the task of speeding up President Roosevelt's emergency re-employment campaign.

Oil Code Due

"This thing is going to work," the militant administrator reiterated as his credo on stepping from an army plane at Bolling Field.

Asked by newspapermen about his trip to Detroit, he held out the automobile code done on pine paper and said: "I got what I went after."

Johnson was met by K. M. Simpson, his chief deputy administrator, and given a quick fill-in on activities during his day and a half absence.

Simpson reported that an agreement was being reached on a code for the oil industry, which a committee appointed by Johnson is rewriting to substitute for proposals presented by the industry.

Among the other troublesome questions in which Johnson will be asked to take a hand immediately is the split between Walter C. Tingle, head of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey and a member of the administrator's industrial board, and a resigned vice-president of the company, James A. Moffett, offered a place on the federal committee and who intends to accept.

GUNMEN DENIED

PITTSBURGH, July 29.—(AP)—Thomas Moses, president of the H. C. Frick Coke company, denies flatly a charge of Governor Pinchot that the company is importing New York gunmen in the southwestern Pennsylvania coal strike area.

In an exchange of telegrams with Sheriff Harry E. Hackney of Fayette county last night the governor said, "I am reliably informed that the Frick Coke company with your cooperation is importing gunmen from New York."

"Please be informed that your statement is wholly without foundation," Moses said in a telegram to the governor.

Employer May Petition

A friend of President Roosevelt, Moffett is expected in informed Washington sources to be selected as an administrator for the agreement which the government is to have prevail in the oil industry.

The interpretations of the voluntary agreement were issued last night by Thomas S. Hammond, executive director of the re-employment drive and Donald Richberg, general counsel of the administration.

They provided specifically that an individual employer who believes the agreement will cause him hardship may obtain a stay of a particular provision by submitting a petition, approved by the trade association of his industry if he has one, otherwise by the chamber of commerce or other designed representative of the N. R. A. together with his signed agreement, and a promise to abide by N. R. A.'s final decision.

As to wages above prescribed minimum levels, the ruling was that the rates of pay, whether by the hour, day, week or month, shall in no case be reduced, either to make up increases in the minimum pay group or to extend the payroll.

It was added that a factory worker now employed 40 hours a week would have to have his pay-rate increased only one-seventh to make as much money in 35 hours, while one now engaged 60 hours would need a five-seventh raise which might prove too great a burden on the employer.

Public Works Board to Talk River Projects

WASHINGTON, July 29.—(AP)—Secretary Ickes said today the public works advisory board next week would consider the three big projects approved by President Roosevelt—the upper Mississippi channel, the Grand Coulee dam on the Columbia river in Washington state, and the Casper-Alvora irrigation development in Wyoming.

Ickes said he was unfamiliar with details of the three proposals, but they would be studied by the board immediately.

He said he had been told power could be developed on the Columbia river more cheaply than anywhere else in the country and said the Grand Coulee dam, Boulder dam, and the Muscle Shoals development would provide a real government yardstick for power costs.

Trusty Has One Month Left; Flees

SALEM, July 29.—(AP)—With only a month of his sentence unserved, Homer Spence, 27, escaped last night from the state penitentiary where he was a trusty.

He was committed from Multnomah county for assault with intent to rob. His mother lives at St. Helens.

Spence has light brown curly hair and blue eyes. He is five feet 11 inches tall and of muscular build. He has slanting scars on the outside of both thumbs. On his upper right arm is tattooed a flower and cross with the word "Mother."

Auto Tag Buying Reported Doubled

SALEM, July 29.—(AP)—Oregon motorists have responded to the new \$5 half-year automobile license by purchasing more than double the number of the higher-priced full-year plates purchased in a corresponding period last year.

State office figures show that 211,761 sets of plates had been issued on July 27, an increase of 108,465 over same date last year when only 103,296 had been issued.

Campbell Given 1 Year Sentence

PORTLAND, July 29.—(AP)—Henry G. Campbell, former clerk of the Eugene postoffice, was sentenced to one year in federal prison today when he pleaded guilty to an indictment charging embezzlement of postal savings funds.

The money was taken in small amounts, the court was told, and amounted to less than \$100.
