Headed by Billie Wilkinson, the rally-polly Albany catcher, the Albany Alcos will journey to Eugene today to tangle with the locals on the Lane county fairgrounds at 2:30. Wilkinson, one of the leading hitters in the league and a dangerous hitter at all times, will be watched very carefully by the Eugene pitchers.

The pitching assignment for Albany will probably go to Chinky Covert, a left-handed pitcher who has pitched for years in the Timmer League, but who now is located in Albany. Covert at one time, in 1928, when pitching for Bend, let the Townies down with but a single hit. Opposing him will be Bob Wiltshire who has been doing most of the pitching assignment for the Townies. Wiltshire has pitched some excellent games and some that have been not so good. Dick Bishop, league leading hitter, will be on the receiving end for the Townies.

Eugene will be slightly crippled in the outfield this week with Guy Green and Bob Quinn on the shelf. During the past week Green had an operation on his nose and probably will not be able to play. Quinn hurt his leg in the Bend game two weeks ago and is such that his usefulness would be very limited. Cotter Gould and Jack VanDyke will, however, be found in the outfield along with Jack Gordon or Charlie Orr.

The Albany outfield will be composed of Dowling, McClain, Hite, Rawlings and Jenks. Incidentally, being one of Albany's councilmen, and well-known here in Eugene, Albany has just recently signed up Lyle Bigbee, a former University of Oregon athlete star of about a decade ago and a half ago, and also former big league baseball player. Bigbee is no stranger to Eugene fans as he has played with Albany, Salem, and Bend on various occasions here. Bigbee is, at the present time, playing in the Lane County League, and whether or not he will be able to with Albany this Sunday, is unknown, but there will be no moaning on the part of the Eugene team should he be unable to be here, as his big bat and his experience have always been a menace to the locals.

Eugene will be fighting this Sunday to keep in second place. While they are fighting for second place, Bend will be tangle with Schapp's, and should Bend lose and the Townies win, it would again be a tie between these two teams for first place. In last Sunday's game at Bend, the heat was something terrific, and as a consequence, the Bend team had a decided advantage being accustomed to the weather conditions.

Washington Swim Team Victors As Star Sets Marks

PORTLAND, Ore., July 20.—(AP)—The Washington athletic club of Seattle, led by Jack Medina, captured the 1933 outdoor P. N. A. senior championship meet here today, scoring 60 points. The Crystal Pool swimmers, also of Seattle, were second with 45 points, and the Portland natatorium, with 17 points, nosed out Multnomah Athletic club of Portland by one point to win third place.

Medias broke two records, one national and one P. N. A. to win high point honors of the day with 15 points. Swimming against time, Medina covered the 1,000 yards in 11:37.2-5, to lower by 47.3-5 seconds the previous mark of 12:25 set by Buster Crabbe of Hollywood.

The Seattle swimmer established a new P. N. A. record for the 400 meter free style event by covering the distance in 5:28.5 seconds. Medina also captured the 100 meter breast stroke and the 100 meter free style event.

Oliver McKean, his teammate was second highest in individual points scored with 13-1-3. She captured first in the 100 meter free style for women and the 400 meter free style, and was on the winning women's medley team.

One of the thrilling races of the day was the 100 meter breast stroke for women. Dorothy Bigham, Frances Bigham and Shirley Bandemer, all of Crystal Pool, neared the finish in a dead heat, but in the last ten feet they separated to finish in the order named. In the medley event, McKean, swimming anchor for W. A. C. was off 20 yards behind Miss Bandemer of Crystal Pool, but overcame the lead to win by a stroke.

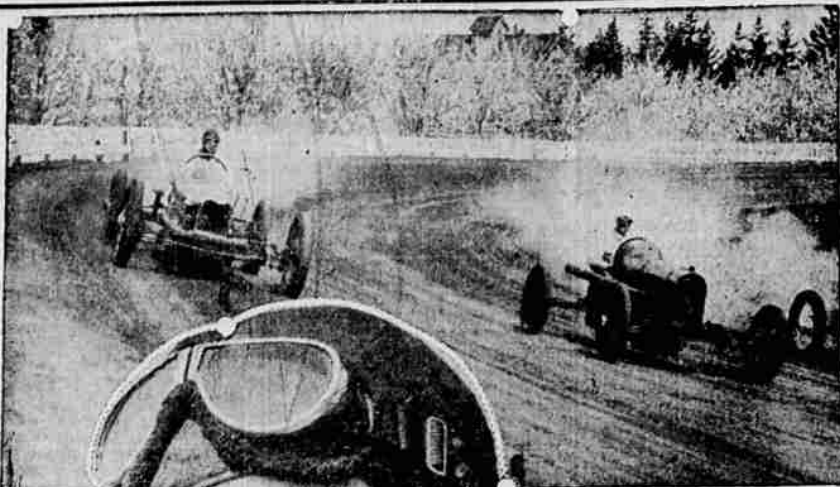
QUEER QUIRKS IRK SPORTSMEN!

Robert L. Miller, of Jacksonville, Fla., the defending champion, reached Portland today and was soon surveying the tournament course. He was accompanied by Johnny Morris of Birmingham, Alabama.

Arthur Sato, San Francisco entrant, arrived this afternoon, to join a quartet from San Jose.

Charley Wilson, Honolulu public links star, was one of the most active on the course, trying to better a 78 which he shot yesterday. Par is 72 and Wilson believed he would be able to cut his score down substantially when he becomes more familiar with the course which he said was "great."

AUTREUIL, France, July 20.—(AP)—The French veterans, Jacques Brugnon and Jean Borotra, pulled the doubles out of the Davis Cup today, with a straight set victory over H. G. N. Lee and George Patrick Hughes, but England remained confident of gaining the deciding victory in the singles tomorrow.

Australia Horse Wins First Race On American Track

SAN BRUNO, Cal., July 20.—(AP)—Winoka, the Australian sprinter, won its first race in America today at the Tanforan track, leading Huen by a length and a half at the close of the five-furlong race. The horse was heavily played and started with the short odds of one to ten. Time was one minute 2-5 seconds.

The horse from the antipodes held the rail position and at the end of the first quarter the two raced head to head. The Australian horse held a short lead at the halfway mark, but then O. Webster, riding Huen, called on his mount and the Hawaiian bred horse held a short lead in the two entered the stretch.

Jokey Edgar Butt urged Winoka then and the Australian horse pulled up steadily into a lead of a length and a half and finished going away.

The time was 2-5 of a second slower than the track record.

DOPING OF RACE HORSE BARED AS 7 ARE ARRESTED

CHICAGO, July 20.—Doping of race horses on a national scale was charged by the government today as its narcotic squads struck with lightning force against a band of seven horse handlers at Arlington park, Chicago's palatial northside track.

Swooping down on the rich track, where close to a half million dollars in purses have been distributed during a month's meeting, federal agents arrested the seven men and then made the stunning announcement that the government had conclusive proof that at least 200 horses, competing in as many races during the past eight months, had been doped at various American racing strips.

As an upshot of the arrests and revelation of the government's sweeping investigation of narcotic law violations, leading officials of Arlington park, which closed its racing meeting today, and a score of jockeys, trainers and owners will be ordered to testify before a federal grand jury here next week. H. J. Anselinger, commissioner of narcotics at Washington, emphasized that Arlington park officials had volunteered and given excellent cooperation in the investigation at their track and the past month and would testify voluntarily.

Commissioner Anselinger refused to discuss reports and rumors of doping at Arlington but the names of two horses, Louie Dear, owned by Jack Howard of turf fame, and Timorous, property of Mrs. A. M. Creech, mother-in-law of Ivan Parke, one of the seven men arrested, were mentioned by the agents.

One agent said he had seen Louie Dear "doped" three times during the Arlington park meeting and that yesterday a hypodermic needle was removed from the horse's neck. Owner Jack Howard denied this. Parke, however, admitted that Louie Dear had been given a drug but only to cure the animal of a bad cold so he could race.

In the races yesterday Timorous won as a slightly better than 3 to 2 favorite but Louie Dear, after leading half way around the track, was beaten by Fiddler, a 16 to 1 shot in the betting. Rusty, a six to one shot, finished second with a nose advantage over Louie Dear. Officially said there was no doubt that both Timorous and Louie Dear had attempted to win as much as possible. Both received excellent rides from F. Springer and C. Corbett, respectively.

The seven men, arrested last night, all pleaded not guilty before Commissioner Edwin K. Walker, who set their bonds at \$2,500 each and continued the cases without hearing. Each was charged with violation of the Harrison narcotic law, forbidding illegal possession and transportation of narcotics. Only Parke was able to furnish bond. The six others, all held, were Dr. Nelson Edward Southard, a veterinarian who said his home was Louisville, Ky.; William "Bottoms Up" Cooney, Charles Mitchell, and William Jones.

Between 400 and 500 grains of narcotics were found in possession of the seized men, Ralph Oyley, chief of the federal narcotic division in Chicago, reported. Bottles of compound supposed to be a mixture of narcotics, syringes, hypodermic needles and other apparatus for administering "dope" also were found in their possession, he said.
