

NO RAIN RECORDED HERE DURING JULY; RIVER HELD HIGHER

Not a drop of rain was recorded for the entire month of July in the report from the local weather office, Monday. While July usually is a very dry month, this is only the fourth time within 11 Julys that no precipitation has been listed. There was none in 1931 nor in 1926, nor in 1923.

The past July's maximum temperature was below the average for the period, but higher than the same month last year. The highest maximum for the month this year was 93 on July 15. The highest minimum was 60, reached also on July 15, as a record minimum temperature.

There were 27 clear days and four partly cloudy days during the month. Owing to the late rains and the melting of a record amount of snow in the mountains, the river was a bit higher for the July record this year than normally. The highest was 4 of a foot and the lowest, minus 1.1 feet. Last year the highest for July was 1 of a foot and the lowest, minus 1.2 feet; and the year before that, the highest was minus 1.3 feet and the lowest, minus 2.4 feet.

The table for the rainfall for the past 11 Julys is as follows: 1933, none; 1932, .30 of an inch; 1931, none; 1930, .01 of an inch; 1929, .04 of an inch; 1928, .10 of an inch; 1927, .05 of an inch; 1926, none; 1925, .06 of an inch; 1924, trace; 1923, none. One will be used out of the Breteln-trace; 1923, none.

The chart on highest maximum and lowest minimum for each July during the past 11 years reads as follows:

1933, 93 and 60; 1932, 88 and 40; 1931, 90 and 45; 1930, 91 and 43; 1929, 92 and 43; 1928, 102 and 40; 1927, 97 and 44; 1926, 104 and 30; 1925, 98 and 47; 1924, 98 and 43; 1923, 91 and 47.

Prisoner Takes Notes

O. M. Clancy, a county jail inmate, testified that conferences in the lobby of the jail, so aroused his suspicions "that something was going on" that he took down their names, and descriptions of the conferees, and a few days later, through his mother in Portland, transmitted what he had gleaned, to Governor Meier. Later the state police took a statement from him.

Clancy also testified that following a visit to the county jail, by state police and the district attorney, Fehl came in their wake, and that he had seen Fehl in conference with Jailer Glenn the day "before or after" the robbery. Glenn was acquitted of a similar charge.

The state expected to conclude its direct case late today. It anticipated that the defense will start Tuesday.

have increased the penalty for kidnapping to death since the abduction wave started sweeping the country.

O'CONNELL WELL TREATED

ALBANY, N. Y., July 31.—(AP)—Three men were held today for questioning in connection with the kidnapping of John J. O'Connell, 24, national guard lieutenant, and nephew of Ed and Dan O'Connell, democratic leaders of Albany, as the search for the kidnapers was speeded up.

"We are questioning three men," was the curt statement of District Attorney John T. Delaney. "I cannot give you further details."

One was said to be a waiter. The story of his abduction by several men, one of whom struck him over the head as he was lighting from his automobile and being imprisoned in an apartment, shackled, handcuffed and blindfolded with only sandwiches to eat was related today by young O'Connell in an interview copyrighted by the Albany Times Union.

The nephew of Albany's powerful democratic leaders said he was compelled to sign several messages to his family but had no opportunity to see any of his captors and did not believe he would be able to identify any of them.

"My feet were tied together and I was handcuffed," young O'Connell said in the interview. "This proved to be rather uncomfortable but the only mark I have from it is a small one on the wrist."

"Because of my blindfold I had no opportunity to see any of the persons guarding me. My eyes were not taped, except to hold the edges of the bandages in place."

"Several times I was required to sign messages sent to my family by the kidnapers. The latter were very careful that I should not see them on such occasions. The bandage was lifted slightly, just enough for me to see the edge of the paper where I placed my name. The bandage was not tight enough to hurt my eyes and they suffered no serious effects from looking for three weeks at cloth."

Young O'Connell said that from time to time his captors gave him white pills of some kind and that they made him perspire and feel drowsy. A physician who examined him, said that there was no indication that he had been "doped" and that the pills may have been sedatives.

"I received food regularly," O'Connell said, "but did not eat much. The chief reason was that it consisted mostly of sandwiches. They can become very tiresome as a steady diet."

Describing his abduction he said he was struck over the head just as he was about to alight from his automobile on the morning of July 7.

"There was no warning," he said. "Several men surrounded me. I had an impression that there were four or five of them, and that one of them pressed a gun into my back. They wore masks, I believe. Before I could turn about or defend myself, in fact, before I could make up my mind whether it was an attempted holdup, I felt a heavy blow on the back of my head."

"I do not know how long we rode after the attack, in fact, nothing was very clear until I found myself in a bedroom, either of a flat or an apartment. The quarters seemed to be fairly good, at least it was not a basement."

He said he was not ill treated but that he had no chance for escape.

"I spent the entire three weeks in that bedroom, on a bed," he said.

M'KENZIE HIGHWAY TO BE OILED SOON

The McKenzie highway between Doyle hill and Gate creek will receive a coating of oil some time this week, according to Raymond Walsh, state highway engineer in charge of maintenance in this district.

This layer of oil will simply be a dust palliative, Mr. Walsh said, but it will be greatly appreciated by the traveling public. Ever since the rock surfacing was completed early in the summer this section of five miles has been the only dusty part of the highway west of the Bellnap Springs road and heavy traffic has caused it to become rutted. The oiling work will require three or four days' time.

Funds for the hard surfacing of this section are expected to be obtained from the government and the permanent surfacing work will probably be done late in the summer.

3 Die in Texas Tornado Sunday

DALLAS, Tex., July 31.—(AP)—Three persons lost their lives and scores were injured Sunday as a tornado swept through Oak Cliff, residential district in southwestern Dallas, wrecking approximately 100 homes and causing damage estimated in excess of \$250,000.

L. G. Searcy, 22, was crushed to death when the storm demolished his home. Thomas W. Henley, 70, died of a heart attack as he watched the storm bear down on him and ran over his house.

Mrs. Mary C. Stewart, 86, died of a skull fracture received when her home collapsed.

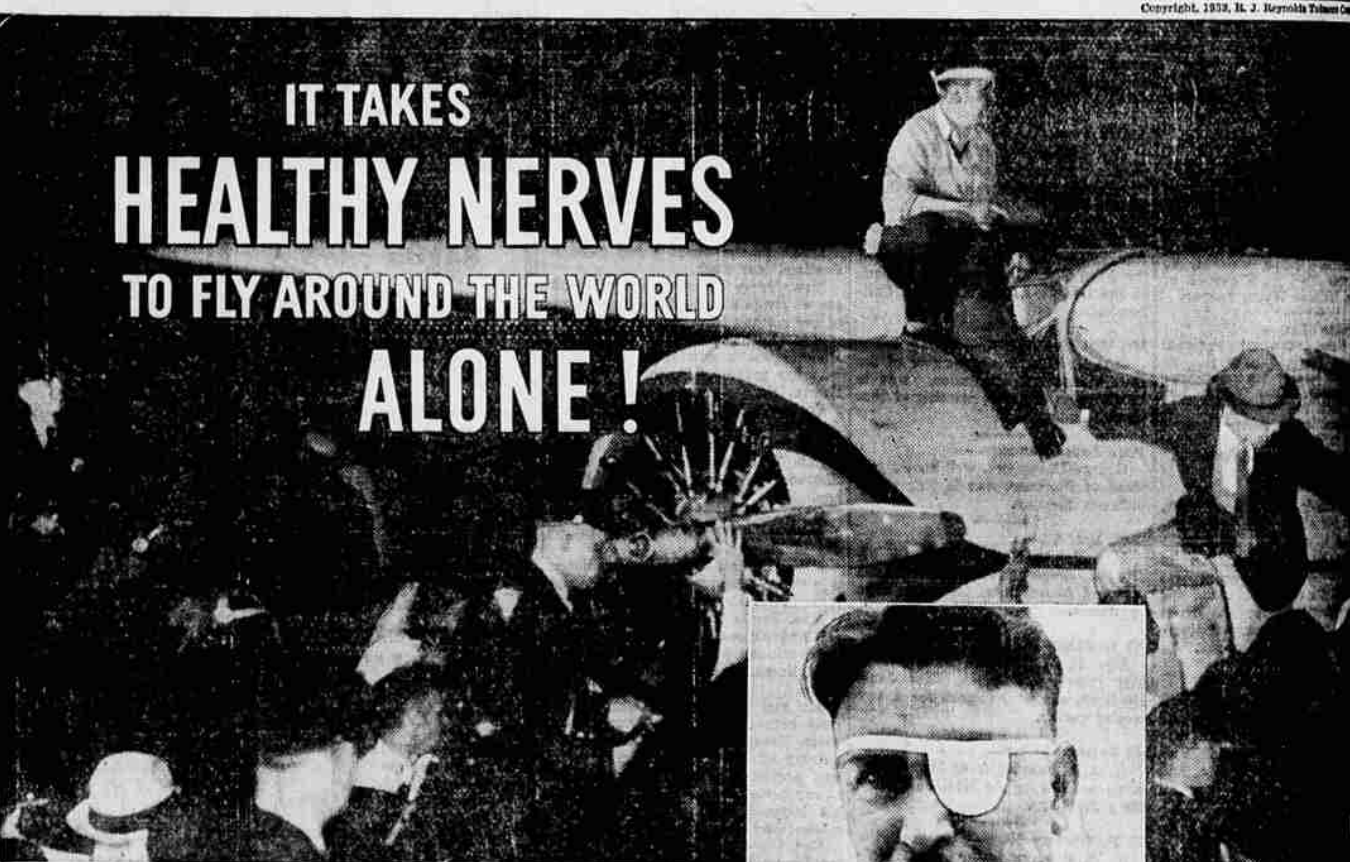
