They moved to the John Day country to homestead, being among the very first settlers in that country. They moved back to Clackamas county, later to Whitman county, Washington, and in 1880 to Portland.
 Surviving Mrs. Ogle are three sons, Volney S. Ogle and Earl Ogle, both of Portland, and Homer Ogle of Barlow, Ore.; three grandchildren; and three great grandchildren. Two children preceded her in death. She is survived also by a brother, L. F. Bluff of Latha, Wash. She was a member of the Alberta Rebekah lodge, Portland, and was an Indian war widow.
 The remains are to be sent to Portland by Branstetter-Simon chapel. The funeral will be Friday at the Wilson-Chambers chapel with interment at Canby.
