

SCOUT SWIMMERS ARE CLASSIFIED

CAMP LUCKY BOY, BLUE RIVER, Aug. 3.—(Special)—Scouts at Camp Lucky Boy were classified into three swimming groups of swimmers, beginners, and swimmers Monday. Fifty-five scouts qualified as swimmers, two as beginners, and seven as sink-easies.

Boys in the sink-easy class are those who cannot swim across the swimming hole (25 yards) and know little about swimming. The beginners are those who are able to swim the 25 yards, but still are not certain of themselves in the water. Scouts who can swim 50 yards and are able to take care of themselves in the water are classified as swimmers. Boys who are in the sink-easy class are George Moody, Francis Denell, Claron Gilbertson, David Knox, Sam Hughes, Buddy Vitus and John Lott. The two beginners are Buster Hamlin and John Burnett. Buster Hamlin at the beginning of the period was classified as a sink-easy, but after two days of practice was able to pass the beginner's test. A new class in fancy diving instruction has been added to the swimming program this period. The class is under the direction of Carl Merryman.

The third period advancement program was started Tuesday with a great deal of work being done in all of the classes. Donald Mason, scoutmaster of troop 2, Corvallis, is in charge of the wood working, wood-carving, and carpentry merit badges and other handicraft projects this period. Mr. Mason takes the place of Morris Hickenbottom who was in charge of this work last period.

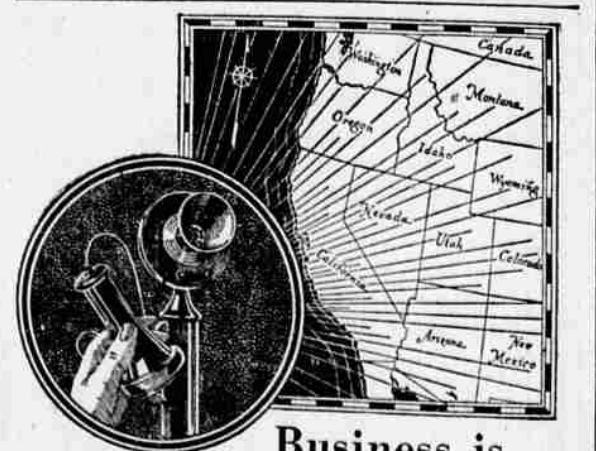
