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Local NRA Committees Have No Power In Wage Questions; Commission Workers Exempt

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Here are some of the questions and answers developed today at the national recovery administration: Do local NRA committees have power to arbitrate wages? They do not, the wages being specified in either a code or President Roosevelt's blanket code, and only the administration here can make exceptions.

What is the status of service employees such as barbers, beauty shop operators and others who have been working on strict commission basis for several years? Are they subject to wage and hour limitations? The President's agreement specifies that it does not apply to bona fide commission workers.

What is the application of the agreements to small businesses employing only a few persons and doing practically no business? They can continue to operate, but if they want an eagle they must comply with the wage and hour clauses.

Is an employer who has signed the president's re-employment agreement abiding by its provisions if he turns off any of his employees? No. More jobs, not fewer jobs, is the objective.

Are operators of large farm employing many workers expected to comply with the NRA agreements? No. Agricultural labor specifically is exempt from the industrial program.

FOUR OTHERS CAUGHT

Dummy Bombs Ready, Too,
For Shipment To
President

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Eugene S. Danell, Jr., of Somerville, Mass., was placed under arrest today on a charge of placing the tear gas bombs that resulted in the closing of the New York stock exchange yesterday.

Danell was picked up by bomb squad detectives in a mid-town hotel this morning for questioning and taken to police headquarters. He is 26 years old and gave his address as 26 Helmet street, Somerville.

Charged With Felony
The tear gas bombs were placed in the ventilator intakes in the stock exchange building yesterday and flooded the trading floor of the exchange with fumes that drove brokers and stock exchange attaches to the streets for air.

The gassing happened at 12:15 and caused the closing of the exchange for the day. As today previously had been declared an exchange holiday, the stock market will not open until Monday morning.

Danell was charged with malicious mischief as a felony, because the damage caused by the bombs exceeded the misdemeanor allowance.

Inspector John A. Lyons said that Danell, under questioning, admitted he was the man who placed a package believed for a time to contain a bomb on the steps of the home of Mayor James M. Curley, of Boston, recently.

Ran for President
Danell is a Boston lawyer and a private in the Massachusetts national guard. A native of Maine he received his degree from Harvard law school.

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Midwest Bank
Loot Recovered
At Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The recovery of \$155,000 in stocks and bonds, stolen in a series of bank robberies in Oklahoma and Kansas, was accomplished by two police detectives who took into custody a man giving the name of Elmer S. Wagoner of Oklahoma City, as he stepped from an airplane.

Detective Lieutenant Lefty James, announcing that a suitcase checked to Wagoner contained liberty bonds, war savings stamps and stocks stolen from banks in the Midwest, said he believed the gang responsible for the hold-ups was that of Pretty Boy Floyd, notorious Oklahoma outlaw.

James said that four members of the asserted mob were in Los Angeles but had not been apprehended. Headquarters had been established here, he said, and more than \$40,000 in stolen securities had been disposed of by "fences" here within the past four weeks.

Wagoner, police said, disclaimed any knowledge that the securities were stolen. "A man approached me in Oklahoma City," police quoted him as saying, "and offered to pay me if I would bring the bonds to Los Angeles. I was out of work and accepted the offer."

Fehl Convicted
Of Ballot Theft

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP)—County Judge Earl H. Fehl of Medford was convicted by a circuit court jury here today of complicity in the theft of ten thousand ballots from the Jackson county courthouse at Medford last February.

The jury required only 20 minutes to reach its verdict. Circuit Court Judge G. F. Skipworth, who tried the case, announced that Fehl would be sentenced next Monday. A penalty of from one day to five years in the state penitentiary is provided for the offense of which Fehl was convicted.

Il. von Schmalz, attorney for Judge Fehl, said last night an appeal would be made to the state supreme court. A motion for a new trial was filed immediately after the verdict was read.

107 FISHERMEN MISSING
TOKIO, Aug. 5.—(AP)—A Rengo (Japanese) news agency dispatch from Fusan, Korea, reported that a severe typhoon struck the coast of southern Korea last Thursday and that 20 fishing boats with crews totaling 107 men were missing. It was feared that many were drowned.

FRENCHMEN SEEK DISTANCE RECORD

Rossi, Codos Hop From New York; Just Plan To "Keep Going"

HALIFAX, N. S., Aug. 5.—(AP)—The monoplane carrying Maurice Rossi and Paul Codos for a trans-Atlantic distance flight from New York, was "near Sable Island" at 11:25 a. m., E. S. T., today, a report from the Canadian East Coast wireless station said.

COURSE UNCERTAIN
BROOKLYN, N. Y., Aug. 5.—(AP)—A trans-Atlantic flight "to nowhere" began today when Lieutenant Maurice Rossi and Paul Codos, French aviators, took off from Floyd Bennett field at 4:41 a. m., eastern standard time, in an attempt to set a distance record.

They planned to cross the ocean by way of Newfoundland and the great circle route and then "just keep going" Persia, Africa, or Russia may be their landing place, they indicated, but they would prefer to land in Karachi, India. Their direction after reaching the Scilly islands, off the English coast, will be determined by weather.

The record they seek to smash is 3340 miles, set last February by Squadron Leader Oswald R. Gifford and Flight Lieutenant Gilbert E. Nicholls of the British Royal Air Force. They flew from Cranwell, England to Walvisch bay, southwest Africa.

The monoplane of Rossi and Codos is called the "Joseph Le Brie" in honor of the famous French flyer who was killed in 1931. It carried 1770 gallons of gasoline. This tremendous load led observers to fear a crash on the takeoff, and as a result city and U. S. navy fire apparatus was assigned to the field, along with police emergency squads.

Lindy Finishes Dangerous Hop Over Greenland

SCORESBY SOUND, East Greenland, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh landed here this morning from Holstenberg, the first man to make the dangerous crossing of Greenland by air from west to east.

Colonel Lindbergh said weather and visibility were ideal.

The American aviator, who is making an aerial survey of the north Atlantic area, intends to remain three days in this the youngest Danish colony in Greenland. All the inhabitants including the sheriff are Eskimos, with a single exception.

Lauge Koch, noted Danish explorer, has placed sufficient fuel at the disposal of Colonel Lindbergh to enable him to reach Angmagssalik where he will meet the supply ship Jellinge on Tuesday morning.

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CUT IN FREIGHT RATES REFUSED

ICC Holds Existing Charges
Not Unreasonable; 3
Members Dissent

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The interstate commerce commission today refused to grant a general reduction in railroad freight rates.

The commission held that existing freight rates and charges, in the aggregate, "are not shown to be unreasonable."

The action was on a petition filed several months ago by the National Grange, American Farm Bureau Federation, Farmers Cooperative Union, National Lumbermen's association, and other organizations later joined in the request.

The petition was part of a campaign by basic industries to bring about a general reduction in freight rates.

Last Survivor Of Whitman
Massacre Dies On Saturday

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP)—The last survivor of the Whitman massacre, Mrs. Gertrude Jane Denny, 96, died at her home here today. She was the widow of Judge Owen N. Denny of Portland, and had been seriously ill since June.

For many years Mrs. Denny had been active in affairs of pioneer groups, and five years ago, when she was 91, she was named queen mother of the Oregon Pioneers. She was one of the last links with the early history of the state. She was born at Ten Mile Run, New Jersey, in 1837, and with her parents, Peter Hall and Eliza Hall, came to the Oregon country in 1847.

Her mind, even in the last few years, was exceedingly alert, and Mrs. Denny was able to tell graphically her experiences as a 10-year-old girl when her father was again by the Indians in the Whitman massacre. Her mother, she and four other children were taken prisoners by the redskins. A month later Peter Shene Ogden, head of the Hudson's Bay company, bought the prisoners from the Indians for blankets, hatchets and trinkets.

INDUSTRY UNITES TO BACK NRA

Leaders Of Both Sides Join
Asking President To
Make Move

COMMITTEE NAMED

Moratorium To Prevent
Strikes, Lockouts
In NRA Drive

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Aug. 5.—(AP)—President Roosevelt today approved a joint declaration for industrial peace proposed to him by leaders of industry and labor in an unprecedented effort to end disputes.

The president promptly appointed a board of seven headed by Senator Wagner (D., N. Y.), a labor authority, to administer the national peace effort.

Other members of the board are: William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor; Walter G. Teagle, president of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey; Gerard Swope, president of the General Electric company; Louis Kirscht, Boston merchant; Dr. Leo Wolman, John L. Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers.

Lookouts Strikes Barred
The proposal was sent to the summer White House by the advisory board of the industrial recovery administration which includes the spokesmen of industry and labor. Mr. Roosevelt issued the following statement:

"Of importance to the recovery program is the appeal to management and labor for industrial peace, which has just been sent to me for approval. With compelling logic, it calls upon every individual in both groups to avoid strikes, lockouts or any aggressive action during the recovery program."

"It is a document on a par with Samuel Gompers' memorable wartime statement."

MILLER IS 5 DOWN
AT HALFWAY MARK

EASTMORELAND MUNICIPAL LINKS, Portland, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Robert Lee Miller of Jacksonville, Fla., today saw a national public links golf crown slipping out of his grasp when he was 5 down to Charles Ferrera of San Francisco, a former champion, at the halfway mark of their 36-hole final match.

Ferrera, winner of the title two years ago, played a steady round against the erratic shots of the champion, gaining two holes on the first nine, and three more on the second.

Ferrera was out in 38 and back in 37 for a total of 75, three over par. His card included a conceded par at the 14th, when Miller poked two tee shots out of bounds and gave up.

The Florida student won only one of the 18 holes as he piled up 79 strokes, seven over par. He was conceded a 5 at the 11th by the scorekeeper. Miller captured the 6th with a birdie, the only one he was able to gain on the morning round.
