

## FORMER CHAMPS TO BATTLE FOR GOLFING CROWN

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Crowning of a National golf champion in Portland today was a big thrill to the galleries but to Robert Lee Miller, of Jacksonville, Fla., and Charles Ferrera of San Francisco who battled for the 1933 National Public Links title, it was just another milestone in their young careers.

The reason the two participants appeared to look upon the match as only another game was the rather unusual fact that Miller won the championship last year and Ferrera the year before.

The weather man predicted more rain for the 36-hole finals but saw only light showers in his crystal compass with the downpour of yesterday when Bob and Chuck waded victoriously through the quarter and semifinals.

**North, South Fall**  
Four southern Californians and two Washingtonians fell by the wayside in the rainstorm as the two "champs" blocked the path to the finals.

Miller tripped up Bud Ward of Olympia, Wash., 2 and 1, and made quick work of Don Erickson, Los Angeles, eliminating the paper carrier at the 13th hole, 6 and 5, Erickson had previously defeated Henry Batista, Altadena, Cal., 2 up.

Leslie Leal of Bellingham, Wash., lasted only 14 holes with Ferrera, losing 6 and 4, but the winner had to show all his stuff to get by Bruce McCormick of Los Angeles, 2 and 1.

The California fireman started out like he was headed for a good fire but Ferrera and the rain dampened his dreams. The former tillist came back on the second nine to gain back two holes and victory.

The Portland fans were getting more for their money than they had expected in the national show with another big 36-hole match on the program for tomorrow.

Their own Tab Boyer was waiting to tackle Leal for the medal trophy—the two boys having tied for the honors with perfect cards of 144 in the Tuesday and Wednesday qualifying rounds.

The spectators didn't care whether Miller or Ferrera captured the championship, but a majority seemed to think that the defending champion had a slightly better chance. The Florida student has had several close shaves but he displayed a neat bit of stroking yesterday to shift the dopesters to his side.

Of five cities which have bid for the National Public Links golf tournament next year, Indianapolis today appeared to have the inside track for the show.

## GIANTS WALK OVER PHILLIES 18 TO 1

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Bill Terry's Giants beat the Phillies, 18 to 1, in the second game of a doubleheader on Wednesday, and when they resumed play yesterday in the third game of their series, the Giants slapped the Quakers with another 18-to-1 defeat.

The New Yorkers hammered Flint Rhem and Al Liska for 23 safeties. Rhem allowing 21 before being removed in the ninth.

This victory enabled the Giants to maintain their three and a half game lead over the second-place Pittsburgh Pirates who shaded St. Louis, 5 to 4, ending their four-game series against the Cards with an even break of two games each.

Boston gained on the Cards by taking both ends of a twin bill from Brooklyn, 4 to 1, and 3 to 0.

They were the only National league games scheduled.

The four robbers got \$2500 in beer stamps and escaped.

Beel was said to have been the only man to throw Frank Gotch during his prime.

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## OLYMPIC MEET IS HELD BY SCOUTS

CAMP LUCKY BOY, Blue River, Aug. 5.—(Special).—The holding of a "discobolus" was the main feature of Thursday's program at Camp Lucky Boy scout camp. The "discobolus" is a mock Olympic meet and is becoming an annual event in camp. The countries entered in the meet were Greece, Spain, Madagascar, Poland and Canada.

There were nine events in this year Olympics including the mile relay, which is the passing of an egg around a circle to contestants, the team getting the egg around the most times without breaking it, winning; the long-winded race where contestants see who can blow up and pop the most paper bags in a given length of time; the discus throw, with pie pies; the base ball throw, with fresh eggs; and many other events of like nature.

The winners of the "discobolus" were Warren Smith, Ralph Hope, Bob Wiegand, Bob Workman, Billy Orr, Bob Berman, Stewart Roberts, John Burnett, Elmer Mallory, Willard Myers, and Clairon Gilbertson. This team represented the country of Greece and totaled 25 1/2 points. Second and third places were taken by Madagascar and Poland respectively with 28 points and 25 1/2 points.

Work in advancement classes is progressing rapidly and already several scouts have completed merit badges. A great deal of handicraft work is being done this period under the direction of Donald Mason, in charge of wood working merit badges, and Jack Stafford, in charge of all leathercraft work. According to Mr. Mason and Mr. Stafford more is being done in these lines this period than either the first or second periods.

A new craft project which has been started this period is that of "boondoggles" making. "Boondoggles" are leather ladings, lengths of leather strip cloth which have been woven into lanyards, whistle cords, watch fobs, and other like articles. The articles are made in a number of different colors and designs and make an attractive addition to the scout uniform.

Inspection Thursday was very high in all of the cabin groups. The winning cabin, the Sea Scout Ship, was only two points less than perfect, having 58. Second place was taken by the Dew Drop Inn lodge with 57 points.

## FOUR HELD IN BOSTON

BOSTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Four men, arrested last night at the headquarters of the "National Independent Party," for questioning in connection with the tear gas bombing of the New York stock exchange, will be arraigned Monday on a charge of conspiracy to promote anarchy.

Acting on a tip from New York police, a raiding squad descended on the loft of a downtown building last night and seized the four: Willis Overton, Somerville, Otto Keferle, Cambridge, Paul Palazzi, West Somerville, and Clarence Lyons, Cambridge.

## Fake Bombs Found

In the loft police said they found fake bombs ready in packages which had been addressed to President Roosevelt, former President Hoover and to Norman Thomas, former socialist presidential candidate. In each "bomb" was an old alarm clock, to simulate the timing apparatus in a real infernal machine.

Police also said they found considerable mail literature and many Nazi emblems in the loft. No explosives of any sort were discovered in the place.

vices; or selling methods which tend to mislead the consumer, shall not be made by any individual or organization selling at retail.

(D) Organizations or individuals selling goods at retail shall be free to advertise truthfully their own goods, policies, services, and their own prices, but reference to the goods, policies, services or prices of competing retailers shall not be made.

(E) No individual or organization selling goods at retail shall make use of, participate in the use of, publish or broadcast any statement which lays claim to a policy or continuing practice of generally underselling competitors.

(F) No individual store or organization selling goods at retail shall sell convict or prison made products.

The code is sponsored by the National Retail Hardware association, National Retail Furniture association, National Association of Retail Clothiers and Furriers, National Retail Dry Goods association, and National Shoe Retailers' association.

freight rates down to what they regard as the general level of prices.

It asserted all other costs of doing business had come down, but that freight rates remained at the prosperity level.

On the other hand, the railroad asserted, if rates were slashed many of them could not meet their interest and rental payments and some would be forced to bankruptcy.

The roads contended even with the freight bill surcharges authorized by the commission in October, 1931 many carriers had been unable to meet their obligations.

The commission today said the present rate level was not depressing the volume of traffic or business of the country as a whole and that "general rate reductions would not stimulate the aggregate volume of traffic by railroad except so far as they would tend to recover traffic from competing forms of transportation."

Commissioners Atchison, Porter, and Lee dissented from the majority.

Atchison, in writing the dissenting opinion, said freight rates stood upon "an unreasonably high level" and their maintenance constituted a violation of the prohibitions of the interstate commerce act against "unjust and unreasonable rates."

## Yoncalla Man Is Drowned Making Fishing Picture

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP)—While a motion picture camera recorded the tragedy, Dolph Samler, 30, of Yoncalla, Ore., drowned at Steamboat Falls, 32 miles east of here Friday.

Gus Peret of Yoncalla, noted big game hunter and photographer, and Samler's brother-in-law, was taking motion pictures while Samler was helping Frank Winch, Los Angeles lecturer and author land a steelhead.

Winch, fishing off a high bluff above the falls, hooked a large fish, but was unable to land it from his position. While Peret photographed the action, Samler crawled out on a narrow ledge near the edge of the deep, swift pool to help land the steelhead. As he took hold of the line, he lost his balance and fell into the stream. He apparently was knocked unconscious from a blow on the head as he fell, for he made no struggle, although he was a fair swimmer.

His companions were unable to recover the body from the pool for nearly three quarters of an hour. First reports reaching here were that Peret might have been the member of the party drowned.
