

Ace Drivers To Meet In Auto Races At Fairgrounds Sunday Afternoon

SEATTLE, DENVER STARS TO COMPETE IN ROWE CLASSIC

The thrill-a-minute sporting event of the year awaits Eugene fans at the fairgrounds today, starting at 12:30, when 18 crack drivers representing every sector of the Pacific coast, meet in an auto racing program staged by Bobby Rowe, prominent Oregon sports promoter. Time trials begin at 12:30, and the main races get under way at 2:30.

The outstanding drivers of the entire coast will be here to contest for the awards offered, and an afternoon of thrills is promised. Led by Art Scoville, the Seattle sensation formerly of Ascot, and Art (Suicide) Hines, the drivers will zoom about the racing track in a number of features.

Grounds In Shape
The fairgrounds has been whipped into the best of shape, and the track has been reconditioned and oiled to afford a smooth, dust proof surface, and insure clear vision for all spectators. A nominal admission will be charged, and the largest crowd to see any sporting event here this summer is anticipated.

Hines, the northwest champion, will find plenty of competition in the form of Art Scoville. Hines will have his Miller Special in perfect space for the meet and has issued a direct challenge to Scoville for major honors. However, it will in no way be a two-man race. Other prominent drivers who will battle Hines and Scoville's right to premier honors include Larry Wright, Fred Roach, Grant Greenburg, all of Portland, and Del Valente, Howard Willis and Devon Smith of Seattle.

The program for the day opens with the time trials, followed by a two-lap Helms Match race, a 10-lap six fastest cars race, third race is 10 laps, featuring the three losers of second race and three next fastest cars; fourth race at 10 laps, with three losers of third race and three next fastest cars; fifth race at 10 laps, three losers of fourth race and next three fastest cars; special event, Scherer Motor company versus Nordling Parts company; seventh race, consolation, 10 laps for non-winners; eighth race, 25 laps, fastest cars only. Officials will be referee: Ely Cronoble; starter, Clyde Clement; manager, Ben Sutton; head judge, W. "Kingfish" Smith.

HIGHCLIMBER

If the 45-foot pleasure boat to be launched in Seattle 30 days from now isn't the most beautiful craft in the world, at least it will seem so to Martin F. Johnson and W. W. McDonald.

They put four years of effort into its construction and if it looks as pretty in the water as it did on a freight car when it pulled out of Eugene a few weeks ago, they'll not be the only ones who agree as to its beauty and trimness. Of course, they weren't working on it all the time for McDonald is a theatre man and Johnson is manual training instructor at Eugene high, but the boat does represent a good deal of work and planning.

It was finally completed here except for the finishing touches which are now being put on at a Seattle boatyard. A Winton gasoline power plant developing 100 horsepower and capable of making 12 miles per hour (11 knots if you want to be nautical about it) is being installed, the deck equipment is being put on and the ship is being wired for electricity. Incidentally, the wiring is all done with lead insulation to prevent corrosion from the water and salt air.

The boat boasts eight Pullman berths and of course will accommodate more people than that on short cruises. The galley is equipped with a gas stove and an

MILLER IS 5 DOWN AT HALFWAY MARK

EASTMORELAND MUNICIPAL LINKS, Portland, Or., Aug. 5.—(AP)—Robert Lee Miller of Jacksonville, Fla., today saw his national public links golf crown slipping out of his grasp when he was 5 down to Charles Ferrera of San Francisco, a former champion, at the halfway mark of their 36-hole final match.

Ferrera, winner of the title two years ago, played a steady round against the erratic shots of the champion, gaining two holes on the first nine, and three more on the second. Ferrera was out in 38 and back in 37 for a total of 75, three over par. His card included a conceded par at the 14th, when Miller poked two tee shots out of bounds and gave up.

The Florida student won only one of the 18 holes as he piled up 79 strokes, seven over par. He was conceded a 5 at the 14th by the scorekeeper. Miller captured the 6th with a birdie, the only one he was able to gain on the morning round.

Lindy Finishes Dangerous Hop Over Greenland

SCORESBY SOUND, East Greenland, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh landed here this morning from Holstenborg, the first man to make the dangerous crossing of Greenland by air from west to east.

Colonel Lindbergh said weather and visibility were ideal.

The American aviator, who is making an aerial survey of the north Atlantic area, intends to remain three days in this the youngest Danish colony in Greenland. All the inhabitants including the sheriff are Eskimos, with a single exception.

Laugé Koch, noted Danish explorer, has placed sufficient fuel at the disposal of Lindbergh to enable him to reach Angmagssalik where he will meet the supply ship Jellinge on Tuesday morning.

L. A. HORSE FIRST IN HANDICAP RACE

CHICAGO, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Gallant Sir, Pacific Coast handicap champion owned by Norman W. Church, Los Angeles sportsman, won the \$5,000 added Hawthorne handicap today before 15,000 spectators.

The winner, carrying top weight of 124 pounds galloped to victory by a length and a half with Big Brand second and Waylayer another length back in third place. This trio was far out in front of the remaining seven starters, five lengths separating Waylayer and Tred Avon, the grey mare from Maryland which finished fourth.

In scoring his first victory since his triumph in the Agua Caliente handicap earlier in the year, Gallant Sir won \$4,925 for owner Church. The race had a gross value of \$8,850.

Gallant Sir ran the mile and a furlong in 1:32 1-5. He was coupled with Plucky Play in the betting and went to the post an even money favorite paying \$4.02, \$2.68 to place and \$2.32 to show.

Pharmacists Ask NRA to Prohibit Cut-Rate Drugs

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Abolition of cut rate drugs and a 48 hour week for the retail drug industry are provided in a code sent to the national recovery administration in Washington by the American Pharmacists' association, a national organization of employe pharmacists with headquarters in San Francisco.

The code proposes minimum wages of \$55 a week for registered pharmacists, \$40 for assistant pharmacists, \$25 for men clerks and \$22.50 for women clerks. Employment of sales people under 18 years old is forbidden.

The code specifies that medicines, drugs and drug sundries be sold only at the stamped price or at a price 3 per cent above the wholesale listing.

Her doctor said her condition was not serious.

Canadian Title Won By Frisco Hawaiian

VANCOUVER, B. C., Aug. 5.—(AP)—A slashing five-set win today by John Murio, San Francisco Hawaiian, over Walter Martin, Toronto Canadian Davis cup star, sent the Canadian men's singles championship south of the border for the second straight year, with Murio succeeding Frankie Parker as Canadian titleholder. The scores were 6-8, 4-6, 4-6, 6-2, 6-2.

A short time earlier in the afternoon, another title, in the women's singles, went south of the border line when Gracy Wheeler, of Santa Monica, Calif., defeated Mary Campbell, of Victoria, 4-6, 6-1, 6-8, in a bitterly fought victory over Canada's third ranking woman player.

Fehl Convicted Of Ballot Theft

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., Aug. 5.—(AP)—County Judge Earl H. Fehl of Medford was convicted by a circuit court jury here late Friday of complicity in the theft of ten thousand ballots from the Jackson county courthouse at Medford last February. The jury required only 20 minutes to reach its verdict. Circuit Court Judge G. F. Skipworth who tried the case announced that Fehl would be sentenced next Monday. A penalty of from one day to five years in the state penitentiary is provided for the offense of which Fehl was convicted.

H. von Schmalz, attorney for Judge Fehl said last night an appeal would be made to the state supreme court. A motion for a new trial was filed immediately after the verdict was read.

Midwest Bank Loot Recovered At Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 5.—(AP)—The recovery of \$155,000 in stocks and bonds, stolen in a series of bank robberies in Oklahoma and Kansas, was accomplished by two police detectives who took into custody a man giving the name of Elmer S. Waggoner of Oklahoma City, as he stepped from an airplane.

Detective Lieutenant Lefty James, announcing that a suitcase checked to Waggoner contained liberty bonds, war savings stamps and stocks stolen from banks in the midwest, said he believed the gang responsible for the hold-ups was that of Pretty Boy Floyd, notorious Oklahoma outlaw.

James said that four members of the asserted mob were in Los Angeles but had not been apprehended. Headquarters had been established here, he said, and more than \$41,000 in stolen securities had been disposed of by "fences" here within the past four weeks.

Waggoner, police said, disclaimed any knowledge that the securities were stolen. "A man approached me in Oklahoma City," police quoted him as saying, "and offered to pay me if I would bring the bonds to Los Angeles. I was out of work and accepted the offer."

Three Bridges On Willamette Road Planned

PORTLAND, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Three bituminous macadam paving projects under the national recovery act were approved today by W. H. Lynch, district engineer of the bureau of public works.

They include two sections on the Columbia river highway, one on the Biggs-John Day river section 9.5 miles long, to cost \$45,300, and other 1.3 miles long on the Dillon section costing about \$6,800.

The third project consists of 4.2 miles between Lime and Huntington, expected to cost \$29,400. The three projects will provide work for about 150 men.

Lynch was advised today by the secretary of agriculture that he has approved three Oregon forest highway jobs which may be advertised as soon as plans are approved. This work includes 4 miles of grading on the Pendleton-John Day highway in Grant county, for which \$100,000 has been allocated, connecting with a section which the state proposes to improve.

On the North Santiam highway six miles will be cleared and three bridges built, at an estimated cost of \$75,000. Three bridges will be built on the Willamette highway in Lane county, one over Salmon creek, and two over Salt Creek, at an estimated total expenditure of \$85,000.

RETAIL CODE HITS UNFAIR PRACTICES

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—(AP)—Elaborate provisions against competition are made in the code for retail establishments, which hearings before the national recovery administration are to August 15.

These trade practice provisions were made public today by the administration but do not become effective until the code is approved.

Wage and hour stipulations for retail dry goods, department and department stores, specialty shops, men's dress furnishings, furniture, hardware, shoe store trades represented by various national associations, have been approved temporarily by S. B. Johnson, the recovery administrator.

The trade practice provisions of the code included:
"On and after the effective date of this code—
(A) No individual or organization selling goods at retail shall sell merchandise at less than the net invoice delivered cost or current net invoice delivered cost, whichever is lower, plus ten per cent to insure labor costs shall be at least partially covered.

(B) Nothing in the foregoing paragraph, however, shall be interpreted to prevent bona fide seasonal discounts of merchandise so advertised plainly marked or of higher priced or damaged goods so advertised plainly marked nor shall any individual or retail organization for the purpose of a bona fide discounting the handling of any line of merchandise or plainly marked be exempt from selling said merchandise at less than net invoice delivered cost plus ten per cent to insure that labor cost at least shall be partially covered.
