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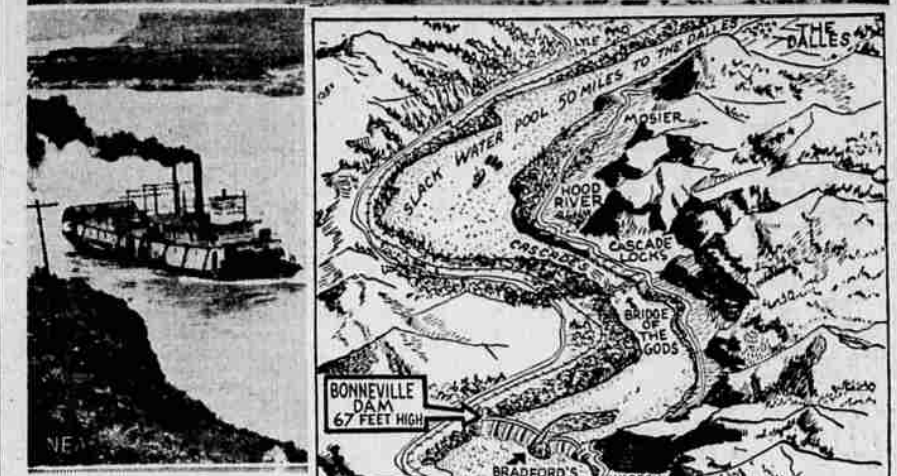
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COLUMBIA RIVER TO BE HARNESSSED FOR POWER!

HEALTH PROJECTS TO BE FEATURED AT 4-H CLUB FAIR

The most physically perfect boy and girl from among the 1296 boys and girls who carried the health project will be selected at the Lane County 4-H fair, August 24, 25, 26 at the fairgrounds in Eugene, according to R. C. Kuehner, county club leader. The health project is handled cooperatively in Lane county by the county health unit, county school superintendent and the county club agent.

Results of the work for 1933 among the 1296 boys and girls who completed the project give an accurate summary of the conditions of the average health of the young people. Six hundred fifty-nine had defects in weight. Of this number 250 made corrections during the project.

Defects other than weight were found in 836 cases, some children having more than one defect; 118 made corrections in eye sight, hearing, teeth, nose, and throat and 2113 colds were had by the members during the time of the project. Improvement in diets in food totaled 5026 and improvements in health habits totaled 3710.

Total improvements made totaled 9536 among the boys and girls that completed the project, showing the results of the project.

Examinations of the members competing for honors will be made at the 4-H building at the fairgrounds beginning at 10 a. m. Thursday and Friday, August 24 and 25. The examinations will be under the supervision of the county health unit.

Four-H club members who have done the best work in their projects, including their exhibit at the fair will be selected as champions.

Basin of awards will be 75 per cent on the exhibit and 25 per cent on the record book and story of work submitted with the exception of the garden project where 50 per cent will be on the score the garden member has received and 50 per cent on his exhibit. Crops champions will not be selected until later due to the fact corn club members will not have any mature corn to exhibit.

At the request of the Lane county leaders, half scholarships to the annual 4-H club summer school will be awarded to the champions. In no event will cash be awarded in place of a scholarship or should a member receive one from another source, it is announced, the balance of the scholarship must be raised by the member by May 15, 1934 or the next member in line will be given the same opportunity.

Club members attending the summer school intensive training in their projects. Projects from which county champions will be selected include sewing, cooking, canning, home making, or room improvement, livestock, crops, garden, forestry, poultry or rabbits and handicraft.
