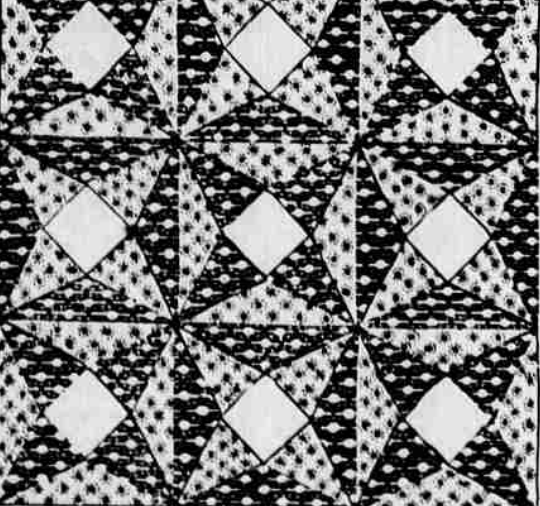

World Without End Pattern No. 483 By Laura Wheeler

World Without End, its quaint religious name adding to its charm, is one of those quilt patterns in which you see one design one minute and then, as your center of interest shifts, you see an entirely different pattern. This quilt, pattern No. 483, is really handsome when finished and delights the quiltmaker by the simplicity of its construction. It is formed by blocks in three materials, two of which interchange in adjoining blocks.

The pattern comes to you with complete simple instructions for cutting, sewing and finishing, together with yardage chart, diagram of quilt to help arrange the blocks for single and double bed size, and a diagram of block which serves as a guide for placing the patches and suggests contrasting materials.

YOUR CHILDREN

NOW about cleanliness in summer! When a mother has so much to do she doesn't know where to turn it seems just too bad to keep on telling her that this and that should be done. But the best I can do is to give her facts and then she must decide how to carry them out as best she can.

A paragraph or two here may help her.

In order to release more time to the children I would reduce actual house work to a minimum. That ironing for instance—when sheets and flat things are washed and thoroughly dried in the sun why not smooth out as many articles as possible with your hands and fold them away? Much ironing can thus be saved. Nightgowns, drawers, underclothes and a dozen other things can be treated this way.

Hide the Dust-Catchers
If you have a storage room or a dry cellar, or a big closet, put away as many rugs, curtains, vases and other dust catchers as you can get along without, and live as plainly as you can. The early morning hours are worth twice the time later in the day. Get a good start and let each child help with small duties, even if not perfectly done.

To get back now to cleanliness. A pediatricist (child specialist) made the statement this week that summer sickness among children, including teething babies, did not result so much from the heat itself, or from eating (if the food is right), as from micro-organisms (germs) taken into the mouth by hands, or by sucking, or chewing on things that should not be in the mouth!

The germs of disease, always flourishing in hot weather, lodge in the stomach, the intestines and in the throat. Tonsil infection and ear trouble are caused by the latter. Vomiting and bowel trouble are the result of the former.

Boil the Feeding Things
Isn't it worth while then to try to observe a few rules about keeping things clean and sanitary?

To boil everything concerned with baby-feeding—bottles, nipples and all paraphernalia of making formula—is something I shall present here again. I have written in previous articles a great deal on this subject, but I believe most mothers now know it anyway. One thing however I shall add. Never touch the part of the nipple that goes into the baby's mouth, with the fingers.

And never, if you can help it, let the other children put their hands to their mouths, or suck on toys or dirty candy. Make them go in and wash their hands and faces with soap and water not only before eating but several times a day and at bedtime too.

Watch the Food Supply
Wash all fruit and raw vegetables as clean as water will make them. And don't dry at all unless the towel is absolutely clean.

Cold left-overs must be covered and kept very cold if they are to be heated and used again. Keep the inside of the ice-box very clean. The less food left over each day the better. All milk must be kept cold, in covered bottles. Don't throw away the caps and don't drop them on the floor or a soiled table. Don't let children drink out of a glass that is not clean.

All dishes should be scalded after washing and wiped on clean dish towels that have been dried in the sun. Soiled dish-towels are responsible for a great deal of sickness.

When vegetables form the part of a meal, the materials are most important. A well-balanced diet combines calories and constituents in a solid manner. The milk can be used in a sauce for a dessert; or a glass of milk may be drunk as a beverage. It may be used in combination with a table, in an omelet, in a salad or in a dessert. Cheese can be grated over soup, or served with a vegetable pie in the dessert, served with the following menu has been prepared with regard to proper value and a tempting color. None of the dishes is difficult to prepare and the meal is very nice.

Vegetable Plate Menu
Ponched eggs with spinach and potatoe marbled in parsley, creamed carrots, stuffed tomatoes, fresh fruit such as berries, peaches, drop cookies, milk, tea or coffee.

Cut bread in slices about an inch thick and toast on both sides. Butter one side, cover this side with a thick layer of well seasoned chopped, cooked spinach, make depression in the center. Poached egg in the depression, with butter and sprig of parsley.

Boiling and Baking
Cut potatoes in marble or vegetable cutter. Parboil in boiling salted water. Drain in melted butter. Spread in a pan and bake in a hot oven until tender and delicately brown, with finely minced parsley.

Fill the tomatoes with a mixture of shredded cabbage, celery and pepper made moist with mayonnaise and serve in a lettuce cup with shredded leaf lettuce.
