## MINING CONGRESS DRAWING INTEREST

A lively session for the Oregon Mining congress annual convention in Baker, August 4-6 and 10, is anticipated, according to R. M. Betts of Eugene, president of the congress. The Baker chamber of commerce is acting as the host group for the event and is looking for more than 1000 delegates from all parts of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and British Columbia. The business meeting starts at 9 a. m. Friday and the banquet will be given that evening.

Dr. Warren D. Smith of the university geology department is to give a lecture on geology as applied to mining. He has given this address in Medford and Portland, crowds being turned away at both. Many of the "sourdoughs" have expressed interest in the talk and plan to be on hand to hear it in Baker.

W. H. Simonds, mining inspector of Idaho, is to explain mining activities and finances in his state. Walter M. Pierce, Oregon congressman, is to tell of cooperation between the government and mining. Carl Silvan of the state game commission is to be on the program as will B. K. Lawson, Portland chief of police, who is vice-president of the congress.

Many from the western part of Oregon will be going to the convention, which is one of the big events of the year for the eastern Oregon section.
