

LANE GETS HIGHWAY FUNDS ALLOCATION

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 9.—(AP)—Highway projects totaling \$1,240,000 were decided upon at a meeting here Tuesday of state highway commission and representatives of the forest service and bureau of public roads. An additional \$75,000 of forest funds was allocated to maintenance and \$35,000 for surveys.

The largest share of the highway funds, \$275,000, was allocated to three sections of the Coast highway. They included: Hobbs-Dolph, \$155,000; Port-Orford, Euchre creek, \$50,000; and Gardiner-Glenade, \$40,000. The largest single allocation was for the Diamond lake road, \$200,000.

Other allocations included: Cascade lakes, \$75,000; Weston-Elgin, \$100,000; Willamette, \$150,000; North Santiam, \$120,000; South Santiam, \$170,000; Tiller trail, \$35,000; Enterprise, Imaha, \$30,000; Lincoln-Berry creek, \$35,000; and Wapinitia, \$50,000.

one single purpose, which is to carry out this specific provision which has to do with re-employment through reducing the number of hours each employee works and by keeping the stores open as long as possible.

The statement proceeded: "Insignia of the blue eagle must be withdrawn from those stores which either collectively or individually flagrantly attempt to frustrate the purpose of the presidential reemployment agreement."

Johnson said "when employers sign the agreement with their president after reading section eight, no one could conceivably set about staggering employ hours, enforcing rest periods, and increasing the time for lunch without pay, or either directly or indirectly conspire to defeat the very purpose of the agreement by materially shortening the number of hours which the stores had customarily stayed open."

In warning the retailers against shortening store hours, the administrator quoted the agreement which was provided for them temporarily pending a hearing on a permanent code of fair competition. The section eight reads:

"Not to use any subterfuge to frustrate the spirit and intent of this agreement which is, among other things, to increase employment by a universal covenant, to remove obstructions to commerce, and to shorten hours, (employ work hours, not store hours), and to raise wages for the shorter (employ work) week to a living basis."

mer mayor of the town of Rogue River, who received four-year terms. Six others who had pleaded guilty were given lighter sentences, and then all, with the exception of Wesley McKittrick, described as the "captain" of guards with which Banks surrounded his residence, were paroled. McKittrick had served a previous prison sentence, the court was told, and this militated against a parole from the bench.

Leniency Recommended
Mason Buxley Sexton, 20, and his brother, Wilbur, chief witnesses for the state, received three and two year sentences, respectively, and were paroled. Earl Bryant and James D. Gaddis, of Jacksonville, described by the court as "d-pea," were sentenced to two years and paroled to an attorney. R. C. Cummings of Rogue River was paroled after having been sentenced to a two-year term. The state had recommended leniency to those who had pleaded guilty.

C. Jean Connors of Pinehurst, last of the confessed Jackson county ballot theft defendants, was sentenced to not to exceed three years in the penitentiary. Connors, 22, was paroled by the court to Attorney H. von Schmalk of Burns, with the proviso that he remain out of Jackson county for one year, that he engage in no agitation or speech-making.

Indictments Stand
Sentence upon C. W. Davis, who entered a plea of guilty, was postponed, indefinitely, or until the settlement of the manslaughter charge against him, growing out of a street altercation last Saturday during an argument over the ballot cases.

All criminal syndicalism, criminal libel, and all other charges growing out of the turmoil were dismissed by the state.

Indictments against Henrietta B. Martin, president of the so-called "Good Government Congress," charged with riotous conduct, and a charge of slandering a bank, against her father, C. H. Brown, secretary of the organization, were not dismissed by the district attorney's office.

The code the group has in consideration is for the 48-hour working week for employees, calling for \$20 for male help over 18 years of age, \$18 for women workers, \$15 for juniors under 18 and over 16 years of age, and for juniors under 16 years of age, 25 cents an hour for not more than three hours per day.
