

DENTAL LAW CASE UNDER ADVISEMENT

Judge H. D. Norton Wednesday afternoon took under advisement the case of Dr. S. T. Donohue, Eugene dentist, against the state board of dental examiners, in which the plaintiff seeks to invalidate the new state law regulating dental advertising.

Arguments of attorneys on the demurrer to the complaint were presented before Judge Norton in circuit court Wednesday. The constitutionality of the law is involved, Dr. Donohue contending that it is unconstitutional.

Briefs were presented by attorneys on both sides and the judge will study them thoroughly before making his decision.

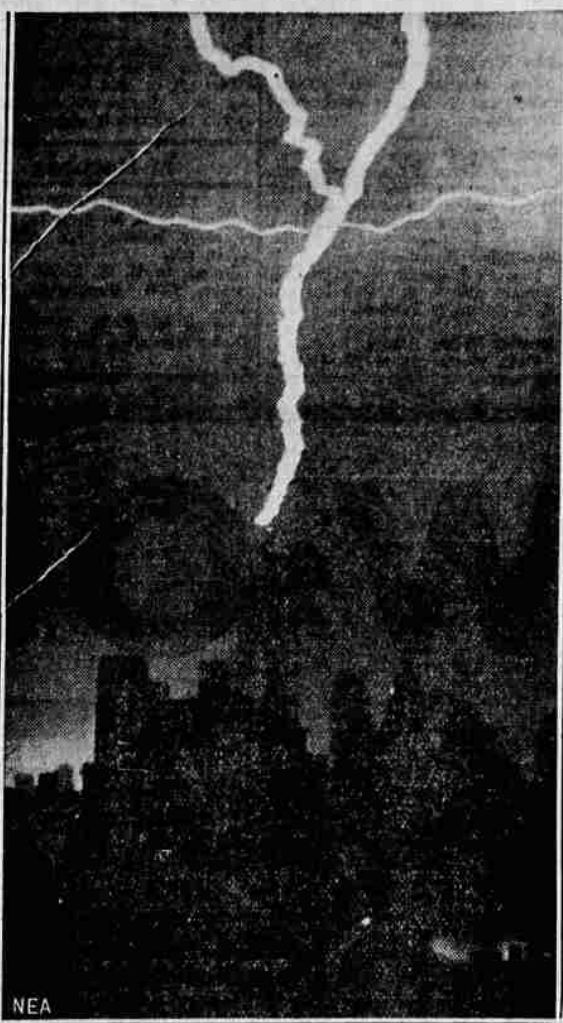

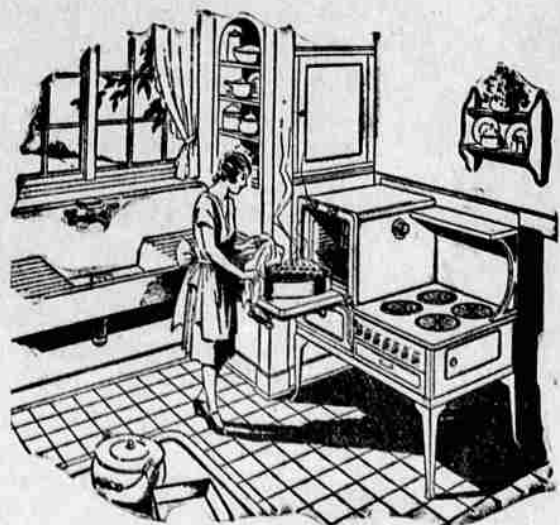
