that the state board of health may be invoked to require disposal where cities are dilatory in acting.

The \$250,000 set up for Eugene includes an estimated \$125,000 for the sewage disposal plant itself and additional money to build new trunk sewers, which, according to City Engineer William Clubb have long been needed.

Building Congress Active
The Eugene Building Congress has been endeavoring to stimulate action on the various city, county and school projects here, but lack of funds for engineering and designing has been hampering preparation of the programs. This condition may be corrected by the creation of a special federal fund on which local bodies will be able to draw for expert engineering and architectural services.

Salem, Portland and a number of cities in various parts of the state have voted bonds for sewage disposal. Similar action would be necessary here before federal funds could be procured. Mr. Clubb said he did not see any hope of getting construction under way before next spring at best.

Library in Good Shape
The applications for the university library and infirmary were presented with complete plans and financing details and were in excellent shape, according to Mr. Palmer, secretary of the commission.

At the request of the state board, these plans were placed in charge of Burt Brown Barker, vice-president of the University and he has given much time to their preparation. Chancellor Kerr has cooperated in the planning, and if federal approval is received work may be under way this autumn.

Fees to Pay Debts
Student fees will be used to retire the federal loans on both University projects, and over a 40-year period the charges will be nominal. The \$300,000 library plans, based on present low costs are figured to give the University a structure as large as the \$300,000 building requested some years ago.

On the governor's commission were Raymond B. Wilcox, Ralph S. Hamilton, E. B. McNaughton, J. P. Newell, of Portland, Robert W. Sawyer, of Bend, Dean H. S. Rogers, of Corvallis, and Harold L. Edmunds of Eugene.

The next step is to get the okay of the state federal committee composed of Bert E. Haney, C. C. Hockley and R. S. Stanfield, of Baker. After that Marshall Dana as regional adviser must approve and then the plans go to Washington.
