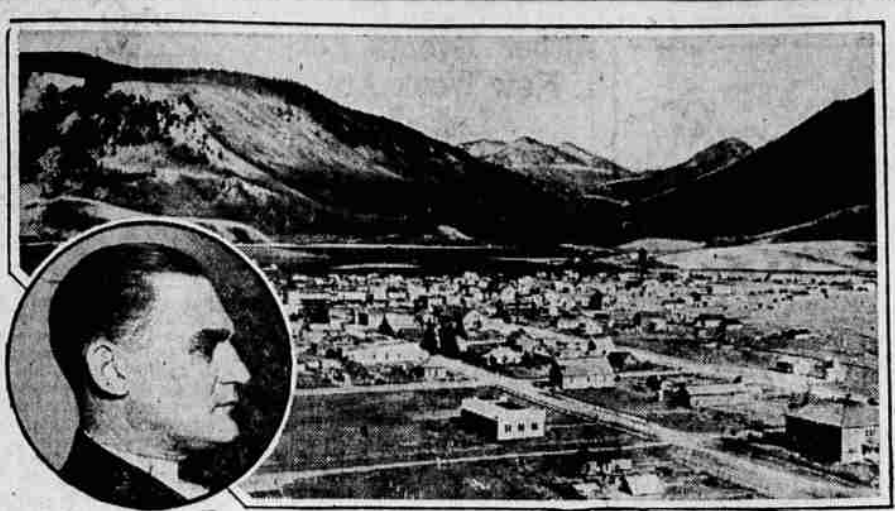

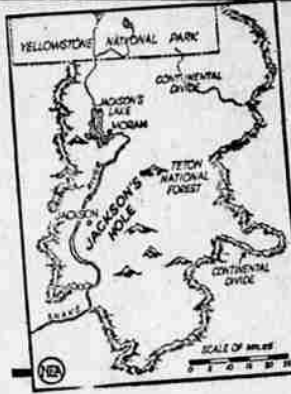

inset. Rockefeller, who offers the
