A special drill to work for the state fair program on Eugene day will be held by the Eugene Junior chamber of commerce at 8:30 o'clock Friday evening at the campus drill shed, University and Fifteenth streets.

At their meeting Thursday evening, members of the Junior chamber made plans to send at least 30 and possibly more to the state fair on Eugene day. The meeting was held at dinner time at the Lee Duke cafe.

Several committees were named by Crosby Owens, president. The group is to work on a project to build up the Three Sisters and upper McKenzie region for recreational purposes to put Eugene on the map along with Portland and its Mt. Hood, Klamath Falls and its Crater Lake activity, etc. Frank Reid, Orville Thompson, Howard Strawn, Lee M. Travis and Chester Smith were named the committee for the winter sports. It is planned to build a toboggan slide and a ski slide before the snows set in. Hal Skinner and Glen E. Fields were named a membership committee, the group making a goal of 75 before the end of September.
