

STRING BEANS NOW BEING HARVESTED

HARRISBURG, Aug. 11.—(Special)—The string bean harvest in the district between Harrisburg and Coeur d'Alene has started. The beans are not in full bearing yet but will be in a few days. Pickers are getting 50 cents a hundred pounds for picking. The crop is said to be good. R. W. Harrington has the largest crop and C. R. Crawford and George Seifert each have good sized patches. The beans are taken to the Eugene cannery.

The local relief committee has closed its work and quit. It has been functioning for a year. Money was raised and distributed, as well as supplies. The treasury is empty and supplies are low. The Red Cross is represented here. Four men and three women have been working on the committee.

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State Surveyors Still Working On Swishhome Route

A party of state-highway surveyors in charge of Engineer J. F. Waller is still at work on the reconnaissance survey of the short road from Eugene to the coast by way of Walton and Swishhome, according to State Highway Engineer R. E. Baldock.

Baldock informed Commissioner Carl Washburne that reports of the withdrawal of this surveying party were entirely in error. He said the crew is definitely assigned to the job and will be on it till surveys are finished and plans are ready for letting a contract.

Approximately \$55,000 of federal money has been made available for this road through the new federal allotment to secondary roads. Mr. Washburne says he believes contracts can be let early in September.

"Realizing the importance of this road," said Mr. Washburne, "we are taking care to have complete new surveys made to get the best possible grade on this route."
