COTTAGE GROVE NEWS ITEMS

COTTAGE GROVE, Aug. 11.—(Special)—A C. C. C. camp of about 30 men was organized about two weeks ago on Harms (C. C. C. Harms Creek) and has been designated "C. C. C. Harms Creek Branch 728." It has become a welcome part of the life of the community. The lads are from many points of the compass, young huskies, clean cut and courteous, and give promise of accomplishing a large amount of road work.

The camp is on the C. A. Van-Schoelack ranch, paralleling the north line of the U. S. Bales ranch, two and a half miles up Harms creek. There are three foremen, with Rolf Anderson, formerly of Washington state, in charge. Another officer is L. W. Amori, Corvallis, civil engineer formerly employed on Roosevelt high-way. He has three helpers, Ed Bowen, well known at Dexter, is in charge of right-of-way clearing and camp.

The objective of the camp is the construction of a one-way road to Bear mountain, between three and four miles north, expected to be completed this fall. Ultimately the road may be extended 10 or 12 miles across the divide to connect with roads in the Middle fork country.
