## BANKS FACES STORY

(CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1)

If he had anything to say, he referred to the amendatory motion made by Frank Lonerger, chief counsel for defense, as court opened, the motion being overruled the same as was a previous motion for a new trial.

There was a tense moment in the courtroom at this time, everyone expecting Mr. Banks to give a lengthy address.

The whole proceedings took but a brief time and the courtroom was quickly emptied and Mr. Banks taken at once to the jail. At no time during the snatches of conversation did he mention the trial, nor the long series of events leading up to it.

With his departure for Salem, Lane county saw the last scene for its part in the spectacular case which aroused southern Oregon so, following the slaying of George J. Prescott, Medford constable, at the Banks home when the officer had gone to serve summons, and which was shifted here on change of venue. The trial lasted most of the month of May here as one of the most interesting murder cases tried in the northwest.

One individual who looks mighty relieved that the big work is over is Ralph E. Moody, veteran attorney, who as assistant attorney general, conducted the Banks trial and since, all the ballot theft cases in Medford and Klamath Falls. Through Mr. Moody and Mr. Lonerger, who conducted the defense's case, together

with all their assisting lawyers, Lane county was privileged to hear during the trial one of the most brilliant arrays of legal talent ever lined up here.

## Mountain Roads Are In Fine Condition

Mountain roads in the western end of Lane county are in fine shape, according to Cal M. Young, county commissioner, who has just returned from that section, having been gone two or three days.

Mr. Young first left the Siuslaw highway at Rainrock, drove up Thompson creek to the summit and then down the Ten Mile creek to the Coast highway. About half way from the summit to the highway a crew of C. C. C. men is doing some fine work on the road with a big heavy tractor and other machinery.

The commissioner returned by way of the Big creek road to the North Fork and over Mapleton hill. The latter road, which is not now used for through traffic on account of the opening of the Siuslaw highway is in excellent shape, he said, and will last the ranchers, who have occasion to use it for many years to come, with little or no repairs.
