

FRIENDS OF U. O. WILL SEEK FUNDS

Small contributions to the Associated Friends of the University of Oregon will be sought here for the purpose of preparing literature describing the advantages of Oregon institutions of higher learning. It was announced Monday. A meeting of a special committee to handle the drive will be held at the chamber of commerce Tuesday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The association points out that many Oregon high school students are planning to attend universities outside the state. In one town, Hermiston, with five graduating students planning to continue their education, all five have indicated they will attend schools outside the state.

"This is a critical situation and one that must be met. If the best interests of the schools of higher learning in Oregon are to be served," it was said. "It is for this purpose that the literature will be prepared and distributed. We are asking only small donations for this purpose."

The committee will discuss plans for contacting persons in the city in the interest of the drive.

The drive has the full support of the administration of the schools of higher education in Oregon, it was said.

"Soul" Topic For Lesson-Sermon

"Soul" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, August 13.

Truth will at length compel us all to exchange the pleasures and pains of sense for the joys of Soul" (p. 390).

Judge Skipworth said that under the statutes he would be allowed 60 days' time but the attorney said he would have it ready by Sept. 20, at which time he expected to file it. In the meantime Banks will remain in the penitentiary.

Trial Cost \$7700
Ralph E. Moody, assistant attorney-general and chief state's attorney in the case, filed with the county clerk a bill of costs of the trial which Jackson county will have to pay. The total cost was placed at \$7,700.00 divided as follows: Witness fees, \$3000; jury expenses, \$4,680.00; trial fee, \$2; prevailing party fee, \$10.

County Clerk Dillard has already received Jackson county warrants to the amount of \$5,690.25 to partially cover the costs of the case.

Sheriff Tom Swarts and Deputy Sheriff George Canady left for Salem with Banks at 10:20 o'clock.

BANKS DRESSED IN
SALEM, Aug. 14.—(AP)—At 12:10 p. m. today the Oregon penitentiary gates swung shut behind L. A. Banks, ex-Medford publisher and orchardist, who was this morning sentenced at Eugene to life imprisonment for the killing of Constable George Prescott at Medford.

Prescott was killed on the threshold of Banks' home while attempting to serve a warrant for the arrest of Banks. A bullet fired through the door tore its way into Prescott's heart.

Banks, who for several years was the stormy petrel of Jackson county political turmoil, became number 12-097 and commenced unloading hog fuel, the usual job for newcomers.

State Policeman H. W. Howard and Sheriff C. A. Swarts of Eugene escorted Banks through the yard and into the main office. The ex-editor wore a gray suit and a hat to match.

Plans to Write
He smiled when greeted by Warden J. W. Lewis and appeared cheerful. He was amiable on the trip from Eugene, reported Sheriff Swarts.

"I have been reading about you in the papers," said Warden Lewis. "I have no statement to make," he told newspapermen, but he cheerfully answered their questions.

"Yes, I plan to do some writing if I get a chance. Of course I realize I will have some work to do here," Banks said.

After being dressed in he said goodbye to the Lane county sheriff and

invited him to come and see him some time at the penitentiary.

Shows Interest
"Banks told me it was 'a new experience' for him while we were coming here," said Sheriff Swarts. "He appeared as excited as a kid going to a circus. He said tomorrow will be his 63rd birthday."

From the moment their car approached the penitentiary, Banks intently observed the station at the outer entrance and in turn scrutinized every aspect of the panorama. His interest in his surroundings did not subside inside the receiving ward, but he was courteous to prison officials and prompt to obey instructions.

Swarts said Banks told him that Mrs. Banks would remain in Eugene. In case of an appeal from his trial it would be optional with Banks as to whether or not he remained in the penitentiary pending its outcome, though it was considered improbable that he would.

Four ex-residents of Jackson county who were convicted of complicity in "unloading" ballots from the court-

house there are now unloading hog fuel at the state penitentiary.

Warden J. W. Lewis said today that Walter J. Jones, ex-mayor of Rogue River, Thomas J. Breechen of Ashland and J. Arthur La Dieu and Wesley McKittrick, both of Medford, would continue on the unloading job until assigned regular duties in some department of the penitentiary farm or manufacturing shops.

him by Johnson, the expectation was that Mr. Roosevelt would approve an elaboration of the idea the administrator is advancing now, like in his St. Louis speech last night when he said:

"If you see a place where there is none and you do any kind of business there you have a right to ask: 'Brother, where is your Blue Eagle?' And (if the answer does not to you seem fair) take your business elsewhere. If every person did that for a week, there would not be a store or a shop or factory in this whole country without its Blue Eagle."

Meanwhile, in the absence of data on which to base correct figures, NRA officials declined today to estimate with any claimed attempt at accuracy, how far they had come toward their original goal of putting 5,000,000 unemployed back to work by Labor Day, but their guesses ranged as high as 1,500,000 and as low as 200,000.

CORNELIUS PASTOR SPEAKS AT SERVICE

Rev. E. W. Hinrichs of Cornelius, Ore., was the speaker for the afternoon services held Sunday in connection with the all-day mission festival for Grace Lutheran church at the Cabin City auto park.

Isaiah 2, 2-4 was his text, and his sermon in part follows:

"The age in which Isaiah was called to prophecy to Judah was in every respect critical, indifference to religious truth, and ingratitude to God for the Gospel promises, together with a resultant social and moral collapse, political corruption, and economic embarrassment—all presented national ruin to Judah and utter destruction to God's church of the Old Testament. The cup of divine patience had been drained. The day of reckoning was there."

"Our own age has much in common with that of the prophet. In every respect it is critical. A 'jellyfish' indifference to Biblical truth is rising in gloom to obscure the fundamental principles of Christian faith and life. As a result the nation has entered the vestibule of a social and moral collapse. Crime in its many forms is almost in popular vogue. Only too often political corruption is rampant. And great economical stress in a world richly blessed with goods, calls for repentance."

"In this crisis the Lord of Lords commissions his prophet, His people, his faithful church, to preach the Gospel, the power of God and the wisdom of God; he commissions us to bring men back to God."

In the forenoon service W. Sylwester of Roseburg had outlined the duty of individual Christians to do missionary work, by showing how that was done by Philip, as told in John. 1.

Mercer Has Narrow Escape From Injury

Mercer, former Eugenean and well known throughout the state as former sergeant-at-arms at the Oregon state senate for years, escaped without a scratch.
