Harvey Noble
Funeral services for the late Harvey Noble of Junction City were held Tuesday afternoon at the Veatch chapel with Rev. E. V. Stivers in charge. Burial was in the new Odd Fellows cemetery.

Harvey Noble died Monday afternoon at 1400 Oak street at the age of 75 years. He was born in Iowa, Nov. 8, 1857 and came to Oregon in 1917, living in Junction City the past two years.

Surviving him are seven sons, James, Charles, Oscar, John, George and Alfred Noble, all of Junction City, and David Noble of Monroe; three daughters, Mrs. R. B. Kennedy, of Shedd, Mrs. Val Lee of Oakridge and Miss Hattie Noble of Portland.

James B. Tapp
COTTAGE GROVE, August 15—(Special)—James B. Tapp died at his home four miles south of Cottage Grove Monday morning at 8:30. He was born August 11, 1854 in Gloucester, England and was 79 years and three days of age at the time of his death. Mr. Tapp was married in Iowa September 29, 1880.

Survivors include his widow Helen M. Tapp and two sons, R. W. Tapp of Portland and A. E. Tapp of Cottage Grove. He had been a resident of this vicinity for 37 years, coming from Iowa. He came to the United States at the age of 14.

Funeral services will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Mills chapel with Interment in the Masonic and I. O. O. F. temple. Rev. I. G. Shaw, pastor of the Christian church, will officiate.

Decision On Sewage Plant to Be Later

SPRINGFIELD, Aug. 15.—(Special)—Springfield will take action on the installation of a sewage disposal system for the city at a later date, it was decided at the monthly city council meeting Monday evening.

Dr. Frederick L. Stricker, state health officer, attended the meeting and outlined reasons for putting in the system, urging the city fathers to do this if possible. A loan for \$30,000 for the plant has been approved by state officials of the federal public works program, but the city has not applied to the national government for the money yet. If the loan were granted, the city would be required to issue bonds for \$21,000 to repay the money. The government would give \$9,000 as an outright donation.

The July audit prepared for the council meeting revealed that the city is keeping well within the year's budget. Of \$12,107 budgeted for general operating expenses, only \$5,749.45 has been spent during the past seven months. The city's budget, including bonded and warrant indebtedness, is about \$41,000. Only \$13,000, or about one-third, of the estimated receipts have come in to date, however.

The council ordered two danger signs to be posted on West D street, where two accidents have occurred within the past year.

FOREST DRY AND DANGER OF FIRE IS FOUND GREAT

A week's trip by horseback over trails in the upper Willamette district of the Willamette national forest by Foster Steele, assistant supervisor, in company with C. B. McFarland, ranger, revealed that the forest is becoming exceedingly dry and while no fires or any consequence have yet occurred there is grave danger right now of the spread of any blaze that might be started.

The trip was made principally by the forest officials to inspect the sheep range in the south end of the forest and to look over the C. C. C. projects being carried out in that section. Mr. Steele said that the range is pretty short this year owing to the lateness of the season. The stock was sent to the forest earlier than usual on account of lack of feed outside and before the range was mature.

In the way of construction, the officials found the C. C. C. men at work on a 53-foot wooden lookout tower on Grass mountain. The
