LARGE GROUP OF OBSIDIANS CLIMBS GRIM NORTH SISTER

The second largest organized party ever to be taken to the top of the grim North Sister peak was guided up the mountain Sunday when 30 Obsidians, led by Itay Sims, scaled the peak. The largest party on record was taken up the mountain by the Bend Skyliners some years ago with 33 in their party.

The Obsidians met a party of five other persons, guided by Paul Laferty, on the mountain, making a total of 35 who reached the top that day. The Obsidian climb was started from the Obsidian camp on Obsidian cliffs at 4:30 a. m. the group taking just seven hours to reach the top. Not content with climbing the one mountain, Stan Crouch, Raleigh Williams, Glen Sims, Delmer Jeans and Eugene Northrup left the main party on Collier glacier and scaled the Middle Sister as a side trip, later rejoining the other party on top of the North.

The main party used ice axes and rope to negotiate the dangerous snow field just underneath the final pinnacle and made the crossing without incident. The day was perfect and from the top an excellent view was obtained with St. Helens and Mt. Adams, in Washington, visible. The members of the camp climbed Cinder cone Monday, the Middle Sister on Tuesday under the leadership of Harold Trotter, and the South Sister Friday under Dot Dotson. Tuesday of this week the group climbed Three-Fingered Jack and on Wednesday were to climb Mt. Washington.
