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entitled to continue to operate under his own interpretation pending final word on these matters from governmental authority.

"I am not acting under any authority conferred upon me by any governmental source, but am simply playing in my position by members of this community to aid in directing this campaign," Mr. McMorrin said. "I have studied the blanket code carefully, have obtained information from responsible sources and believe I am in a position to make sound judgments as to its provisions. However, we are not yet making any attempt to force our opinions on anyone."

Formal Complaints Asked

Complaints as to improper operations in any establishments may be made to NRA headquarters here, provided the person who makes the complaint is prepared to do so formally, signing the proper papers, it was pointed out. These will all be investigated.

gated and an attempt made to adjust matters to the satisfaction of all.

The general directorate of NRA will meet again Monday at 4 o'clock for a general discussion of problems which have arisen since last Monday's meeting.

Grocers of the county will gather at the chamber of commerce Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock at which time there will be an attempt made to adjust their differences and get them united on a code.

Postmaster Darwin E. Yoran Thursday ordered several thousand more NRA stickers and posters as the supply here is virtually depleted. Only the large posters remain and not many of them.

The new posters should be here within five days, Mr. Yoran said.

More difficulty in coming to agreements on codes was experienced by paint men at their meeting at the chamber of commerce Wednesday evening and as a result it was decided to schedule further meetings with two groups meeting separately. The paint-contractors will meet at the chamber next Wednesday night at 7:30 o'clock and the journeymen painters will gather at the Eugene Mirror and Glass plant Tuesday at 7:30 o'clock.

The meeting decided to take advantage of the re-employment law

which provides for a period of six weeks during which a work-week of 40 hours instead of 35 hours may be in effect. The code provides that the period of the 40-hour weeks starts Thursday. After six weeks, the 35-hour week will be in effect.

In discussing wages, the meeting considered a plan for a rate of 60 cents an hour for employed painters and 75 cents an hour for contract painters, the difference being for overhead costs and solicitation. The group was unable to come to a definite decision on the problems and therefore decided on the separate meetings.

Industrial Union Elects

Officers for the recently organized Industrial union were elected at a meeting at the Labor temple Wednesday night as follows: Hugh Reynolds, president; T. F. Wright, vice president; Miss Lucy M. Crow, secretary. Charles Turner, chairman, Bob Leber, Lucy Crow, Charles Hanson and George Adams were named on a committee to draw up a constitution and by-laws which will be presented at the next meeting of the group next Wednesday night at 7:30 o'clock.

Robert M. Fischer, Jr., organizer for the American Federation of Labor here, addressed the meeting, declaring that it was organized primarily for the protection of employed workers not otherwise affiliated with unions. However, he said, unemployed men and women were urged to join the union which will make every effort to help them find jobs and to protect their rights when they are working under employers flying the Blue Eagle of NRA.

This protection feature was described by Mr. Fischer as follows: A vigilance committee will investigate all complaints made by members at the regular meetings of the union, this committee reporting to the two members of the Central Labor council representing the Industrial union and the council will report the violation of the NRA code direct to American Federation of Labor headquarters in Washington, D. C.

Wood sawyers of the county are to meet Friday night at 8 o'clock at the chamber of commerce for organization. A small group met Wednesday night and named G. Bauer as temporary chairman.

Through an error it was announced Wednesday that feed men of the city were to meet Wednesday evening. The meeting is scheduled for Friday evening at 7:30 o'clock at the chamber of commerce.

Wood dealers will meet at the chamber of commerce Thursday night to discuss details of their code and wood prices. The barbers' union also will meet Thursday night at the chamber. Both meetings are scheduled for 7:30 o'clock.

Earl M. Drew Thursday announced a meeting of all general contractors to be held Friday evening at the chamber of commerce, starting at 7:30 o'clock. Discussion of the NRA code will feature the meeting and it is hoped to be able to adopt a code at that time.

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ther was generally cooler in other parts of the state. At Pendleton 108 degrees was registered, the hottest day of the year. The sky, nevertheless, was cloudy.

Valuable Timber Burns

C. C. Scott of the state forest fire patrol, said that if the weather remains as it was during the morning hours today, the fires would soon be under control. Great progress was made toward controlling them yesterday afternoon, he said.

The entire fire area in the Wilson river and Gales creek sections embraces about 10,200 acres. Some of the finest virgin yellow fir in Oregon was attacked by the flames yesterday, mostly in holdings of the Cross-western and Blodgett companies.

Dense smoke and haze made it impossible to estimate the damage. The wind died down yesterday and this prevented the spread of other fires by sparks and flaming brands. Young members of the Civilian Conservation Camps were giving an exceptionally good account of themselves, forestry officials said. They are from three camps, Willark, Mist and Hamlet.

Eight fires caused by lightning in the Dead Indian section of the Rogue national forest were brought under control yesterday by Conservation Corps Workers.

FOREST AREAS CLOSED

Three areas in the Willamette national forest in Lane county have been closed by proclamation of Governor Meier because of high fire hazards, state forestry officials announced Thursday.

These areas are in the Portland creek and Big Fall creek areas and a portion of the area on the south fork of the McKenzie river.

Areas under absolute closure are relatively small. They are located in inaccessible regions where fire dangers are extreme. Most of the entire closed regions contain debris from trees blown down during the heavy wind storm of April, 1931.

The selection, retention and advancement of employes will be on the basis of individual merit without regard to their affiliation or non-affiliation with any labor or other organization."
