Mary Reynolds Is Winner at Goshen
GOSHEN, N. Y., Aug. 17.—(AP)—Little did the late Pop Geers, whose name is synonymous with light harness racing, realize that the husky boy of 23 years, who came to him to learn the art of the sport 36 years ago, would some day drive the winner of a trotting race worth more than \$40,000.
In those days it was unheard of for a trotter earning that much in a single race or in one year. But yesterday Ben White, now a grey-haired 60-year-old veteran of the sulky, turned the trick when he guided Mary Reynolds, a slim bay filly, owned by W. N. Reynolds, of Winston-Salem, N. C., to victory in the seventh renewal of the Hambletonian.
White ranks Mary Reynolds as one of the best horses he has driven and his contention is borne out by the filly's time of 2:03 3-4, which she made in winning the first heat. J. I. Lyle's Brown Berry, of Plainfield, N. J., trotted a mile in the same time in beating Mary Reynolds in the second heat.
