The office is located over the Pay-N-Tak store.

Men enlisting at Vancouver Barracks will be eligible for transfer to Alaska and other outposts if they volunteer for duty there, Herrmann points out.

WHEAT MEETINGS START THURSDAY

The first of a series of wheat meetings in Lane county communities will be held Thursday evening at the Irving grange hall for that community. O. S. Fletcher, county agent, announced Thursday.

The meeting will start at 8 o'clock and all wheat growers of that section are urged to attend.

The purpose of the meeting will be to explain the operation of the proposed wheat production control associations in connection with the nation's move for acreage reduction in the wheat crop. L. R. Breithaupp, extension economist of Oregon State college, will attend the meeting and will aid in outlining the plan.

Following this meeting, the second of the series will be held at Springfield in Taylor's hall Friday evening at 8 o'clock, and Saturday evening the third meeting will be held at Junction City at the Danish hall with Prof. G. R. Hyslop, of the state college, addressing the meeting.

All these meetings are preliminary gatherings at which details of the plan will be discussed and explained. In each community, a second meeting will be held exactly one week from the first at which time wheat growers will form their control associations, electing a community chairman and two other committee men.

Contracts will be signed and the association will be prepared to operate under the national regulations.

Seed Inspection Reported in Lane

Field inspections of clover and bent grass stands for certified seed were made Wednesday by County Agent O. S. Fletcher and Professor G. R. Hyslop, of the Oregon State college in Lane county.

At Riverview, the clover stand of Loren Edwards was inspected and approved for seed purposes. Mr. Edwards is raising a 25-acre patch of Ohio red clover for seed.
