SAFETY LANES FOR
CROSSINGS PLANNED

Safety lanes will be established on the Pacific highway where there will be forced to cross the street in order to reach the school and Lincoln schools this year, as announced Friday by H. G. Gould, superintendent of city schools.

Any pupils will be forced to cross the street this year, due to the closing of Geary school. A large number of pupils living south of the city and S. P. tracks will attend Whitaker school this year. In going with Chief of Police Carl Egan, Mr. Gould Thursday surveyed the area and laid out routes for the children to follow.

Pupils in the south area who attend Whitaker school will be routed the west side of Van Buren street to the railroad tracks where a crossing will be built, running at the service station at the end of the highway. At Grand street, where the pupils must cross the highway to reach the school, the first few days of school, an officer will be stationed there for the protection of the children. Junior traffic officers will be appointed to aid the younger children crossing the highway.

Pupils who live north of Sixth street west, who must cross the highway to reach Lincoln school at 10th and Monroe, there will be established safety lanes at Sixth and 10th, with an officer stationed at the opening of school.

Each week, Mr. Gould believes, pupils will soon learn the routes to take and with the safety lanes established and junior traffic officers appointed, there will be no trouble involved at any of the crossings.

Two cans out of every 12 filled by the cannery are retained by the county for relief work this winter. This is the second visit the cannery has made here this summer. It will be here again in September for two days.

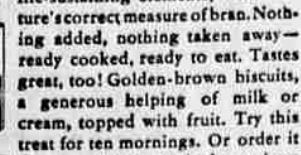
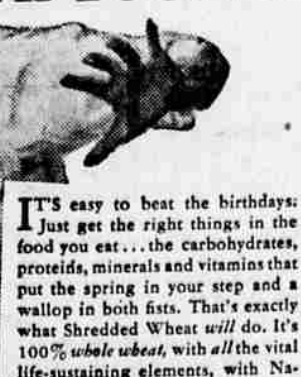
