

Wheat Market Up Again; Stocks Suffer Boredom

RISE OF SEVERAL CENTS PER BUSHEL IS REPORTED HERE

Wheat was up again Saturday, the local market price advancing from 62 cents to 66 cents a bushel following reports from the Chicago grain market.

Barley was down a dollar a ton \$18 being offered and oats were also a dollar less than before, the figure offered in Eugene being \$20 to \$24 a ton.

GENERAL DULLNESS PREVAILS; RALLIES, DROPS SHORT-LIVED

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—(AP)—A sudden decline on Wednesday—coinciding with a break in grain—and a sharp recovery the following day, when cereals spurted, enlivened an otherwise dull week on the stock exchange.

Except for these signs of life, the market suffered from acute ennui. Stocks were influenced by events in the Chicago Board of Trade, although they looked an attentive ear to fresh rumors about inflation. The market was thin all week.

The stock exchange was closed today in line with the summer schedule. The grain market celebrated the termination of a minimum "pegged" price on Wednesday by a prompt drop to the full limit permitted for a single day's fluctuations. Stocks came tumbling after, but the picture was reversed the next day.

On the bond market trading plodded along and price changes were generally confined within a narrow range. Commodities were steady on the whole.

The dollar got the worst of it in the foreign exchange markets where traders jump at the shadow of an inflation rumor. Apparently the chief basis for the new money stories was the White House visit of certain members of congress who also happen to be confirmed inflationists.

Wide attention centered on a report of Secretary of Labor Perkins indicating that employment has risen to the level of October, 1931, with July payrolls \$29,000,000 above the weekly wage in March.

While food prices advanced 1.3 per cent last month, said Miss Perkins, payrolls gained 7.9 per cent in the same period.

The banking structure, as a whole, came in for praise from the secretary of the treasury's executive, assistant who pointed out that deposits in banks, reopened since the banking holiday, totaled more than \$1.7 billion dollars. Only about 2.1 billion remains tied up in closed or restricted institutions.

Week-end trade reviews found no appreciable modification in the forward movement which business has enjoyed in recent months.

Wheat Prices Up; Buying Is Heavy

CHICAGO, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Big concentrated buying that totaled far into millions of bushels hoisted wheat higher and higher in the last hour today. Topmost prices came shortly before the close.

One broker alone took upward of 5,000,000 bushels. In the past, he has often represented United States government financed corporations, and it was popularly conjectured his buying today was for a possible deal with the orient on government account.

Profit taking caused some reaction at the last, and wheat closed unsettled 3 1/2 to 5 1/2 cents above yesterday's finish. Corn 3 1/2 to 3 3/4 up, oats 1 3/4 to 1 3/8 advanced, and provisions showing 15 to 30 cents gain.
