

McDonald Shows "Double Harness"; Colonial Has Summerville-Pitts Film

ex, State Have Epic Dramas; Bebe Daniels Stars In Heilig Picture

Daniels again sings in "Cocktail Hour," a Columbia production which is being shown at the Heilig theater. Daniels is the musical comedy star of the picture, which is a beautiful voice. Slim Summerville and Zasu Pitts return to Eugene today on the Colonial screen in their latest starring production, "Her First Mate," direct from an extended run at the Broadway in Portland. "Her First Mate" is taken from a famous story. It was a Broadway play entitled "Salt Water" by Dan Jarrett, John Golden and Frank Craven. It played at the John Golden theater with Frank Craven, Una Merkel, Claude Cooper, Alan Goode, Edith Elliott, and Patricia O'Hara. In support of Slim and Zasu will be found Una Merkel, who plays in the stage version, Warren Hymer, Rerton Churchill, Jocelyn Lee and those salty looking character men, George Marion and Henry Armetta. "Her First Mate" is all about a candy butcher on a Hudson River steamboat who had successfully kidded his wife into the belief that he was a great sailor-man and whose one ambition was to captain a sea-going vessel. Headed by Walter Huston as the president who overnight is transformed from an insincere, backslapping politician to a man of iron, the distinguished cast of "Gabriel Over the White House" includes Karen Morley, Franchot Tone, the Broadway stage star, Arthur Byron, Dickie Moore, C. Henry Gordon, David Landau, Samuel Hinds, William Pawley, Jean Parker and Claire Dubrey. In view of the steps President Roosevelt

has taken toward easing the depression, the picture takes on real significance. It will play Monday and Tuesday.

"Cavalcade," the picture of a generation, opens Sunday at the Rex for four days. This drama whose theme is the effect of world events on the home and family has been hailed as the greatest written in the English language in a score of years. The author, Noel Coward, known for his successes, enjoyed the distinction of having his play run for a solid year at the Drury Lane theater in London. The story of "Cavalcade" is the story of the Marryott family, Jane, Robert, their two sons, Joe and Edward; and their servants, Ellen, Bridges, and their daughter, Fanny.
