

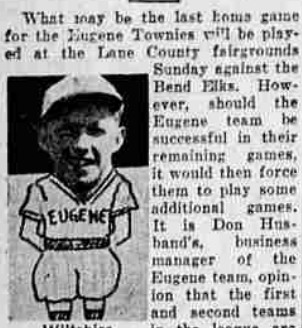
Townies To Meet Bend In Crucial Game At Fairgrounds Here Sunday

What may be the last home game for the Eugene Townies will be played at the Lane County fairgrounds Sunday against the Bend Elks. How ever, should the Eugene team be successful in their remaining games, it would then force them to play some additional games. It is Don Husband's, business manager of the Eugene team, opinion that the first and second teams in the league are to play a three game series to decide the championship, the same as was done last year. However, word has been sent to Ray Brooks, secretary of the league, to get definite information concerning this.

While Eugene is playing Bend, Wolters are to play a double header against Albany, and Schapps tangle with Salem at Salem. The game Sunday will decide the three game series between Eugene and Bend, as each team has won one and lost one. The Townies will be in fairly full strength with plenty of reserve on hand. The infield will probably be composed of Husband at first, Russell at second, Wirth at short, and Dunn or Imman at third. The outfield will be made up from the following players: Quinn, Green, Van-Dyke, Cotter Gould, Stew Milligan and Al Dietz, all of which are capable of taking their turn without cutting down the efficiency or strength of the team. This is the first season that Gould has not been one of the leading hitters in the league, and this is probably due to the fact he has not played a sufficient number of games to attain his proper hitting strength. Last year in the middle of the season he was hitting about .200 and at the end of the season was leading the Eugene hitters with the fairly decent average of .359.

The hitting averages for the local club this year have been far below what they have been for the last two years. In the season of 1931 the Townies had the rather unusual average of .340 which included pitchers, utility men and all. Last year the final average was .260. This year the present average is the fairly low average of .216; however, so far the Townies have won a fair percentage of their games.

The game Sunday should develop into a fairly hard pitching battle between Wiltshire and Murphy, two of the best pitchers in the league. Two of the best catchers will also be seen in Dick Bishop, youthful Townies receiver, and the veteran Eubanks of Bend. Another veteran that will be worthy of watching on the Bend team is Pete Hepting, shortstop. Hepting played third base for the championship Bend team in 1928 and last year played third base for the colorful House of David ball club. In 1928 Hepting was one of the most dangerous hitters in the league, and has not slackened down any during the intervening years. However, to match him, the Townies have VanDyke, Bishop and Russell, whose averages are .400, .394 and .368 respectively.

Next Sunday the Townies play Salem at Salem, while Schapps tangle with the Federals in Portland, and Albany plays at Bend.

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Cross Section of Opinion Shows Yanks Perched on Rocks

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—(AP)—Here's encouraging news for the Washington Senators, if they need any encouragement, and another sock for the staggering Yankees, seven and a half games behind at the start of the final drive for the American league flag.

The home folk, experts and common people alike, have "given up" on Babe Ruth and his bruised partners. They've started breaking up for Colonel Jacob Ruppert and Manager Joe McCarthy the club they saw sail through the league last season and top off a common gallop with four straight world series victories over the Cubs.

They're busting up the old murderers' row, selling players, buying new ones, getting ready for next season. It will be just as well, probably, if the colonel and Joe do not hear about it.

But here's a cross section of a discussion wherein baseball men of an official status, and a couple of fellows who have to pay to get in.

"The Yanks not only are old—the Babe's edging 40—but they look older. They've played together too long. Ambition dulls with close contact among players year after year. They take themselves, their surroundings, their jobs for granted. That's why old ball players, traded to new scenes, new competition, take on a fresh lease on life."

"That was a man who knows the players well."

"Actually the Yanks owe this year's failure entirely to pitching. Gomez, Allen, Ruffing, Brown, MacFayden Moore, all have flopped. The hitters had tried hard and often to keep the team up there. Did you ever go up there with the bases full knowing you had to triple? The infielders have to throw out every play. The result is pressure every play every game. So the Yanks blew. Any team would."

"That was an expert who sees them play every day."

"The Yanks need a whole new pitching crop for next season. They want Paul Dean, Dixie's brother, from Columbus but the Cards won't let him go. There's a \$30,000 tag on Fritz Ostermueller, one of the Card's southpaws at Rochester, and they're nibbling at him. They may buy Leslie Munns from St. Paul for a lot of money, but he's not ready. Johnny Bronson, the Yale kid, is a grand bet but he's a year away."

"Red Rolfe, two years out of Dartmouth, is hitting .323 for Newark and don't bet he won't play short for the Yanks next season. Jack Saltgaver will get a big chance to out Tony Lazzeri. Some one will be in Joe Sewell's place at third."

"Ben Chapman is the only outfielder sure of his job next year though Ruth will be going up there, in a pinch anyway, as long as he can carry a bat. Dixie Walker will be a regular. There's nothing worth looking for in the minors."

"This was a fellow who goes out and buys players."

"I don't care. The Babe isn't hitting 'em any more. I'm going up to see the Giants."

"That was one of those who buys tickets."
