WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—

there is no runaway market."

He said the national industrial re-

covery act would increase prices to

meet new costs imposed by compli-

ance with the trade charters, but

just because of this "there is no rea-

son to go way beyond reason."

He told the retailers that the code

CONFERENCE TALKS  
LEGISLATURE CALLShortage in Relief Funds  
May Force State-  
Wide Action

PORTLAND, Aug. 22.—(AP)—The question whether the Oregon legislature must be assembled in special session to provide funds to carry on relief work in this state, was to be determined at a conference to be held here this afternoon under the call of Governor Meier.

The source of state funds for further unemployment relief was the immediate reason for the conference. Federal officials declared unless Oregon advances \$2 for every dollar of federal money, there will be no more federal aid for relief of the unemployed.

During the past two years about \$4,000,000 in federal money has been available for relief in Oregon. Relief funds in the state face exhaustion at an early date and it is estimated that at least \$1,000,000 will be required for relief in November and December.

Among those summoned to the governor's conference, which was to meet at 3 p. m., were Marshall N. Dunn, R. N. Stanford, Dean James Gilbert and C. C. Hockley, representing the federal public works administration; Henry B. VanDuzer, chairman of the state recovery board; Raymond B. Wilcox, chairman of the governor's state relief committee; Charles V. Galloway, chairman of the state tax commission; Leslie M. Scott, chairman of the highway commission; Earl Snell of Arlington, speaker of the house; and Senator Joe E. Dunne of Portland. Fred Kiddle, president of the senate, was unable to attend.

Not only has the unemployment relief situation precipitated pressure upon the governor for a special legislative session, but the state's tax situation, especially as it bears upon the public schools, bus and truck tax, and liquor control legislation, have a bearing on the problem.

What Governor Meier wants to know, especially from the public works administration, is to what extent it will be able to absorb the unemployed in the immediate future and thus lighten the state's relief load.

Eight Killed When  
Train, Truck Crash

LUMBERTON, N. C., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Eight Lenoir county farmers were killed and three critically injured here today when their 40-horsepower truck crashed into a Seaboard Airline gas-propelled passenger train running from Hamlet to Wilmington.

The truck, loaded with tobacco for the Fairmont market and occupied by a group of farmers from Deep Run, 10 miles from Kinston, crashed into the side of the train. Bodies of three of those killed were strewn along the tracks for 300 yards.

## FRED H. KIDDLE DIES

LA GRANDE, Ore., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Fred H. Kiddle, uncle of Fred E. Kiddle, president of the state senate, died at his home at Island City last night after a short illness. Death was caused by heart disease according to reports. Fred H. Kiddle was manager of the Pioneer Flouring mill, with plants at Island City, La Grande, Union and Elgin.
