

U. S. IS ADVERSE TO DUMPING, WHEAT CONFERENCE TOLD

LONDON, Aug. 22.—(AP)—Frederick E. Murphy, American wheat delegate, said today that even if no agreement is reached at the international wheat conference which got under way today the United States will not resort to dumping to get rid of its surplus. Mr. Murphy, publisher of the Minneapolis Tribune, declared that the United States won't try to maintain the wheat price at a reasonable level if the nations represented at the conference failed to get together on a program. America would consider means of getting rid of the surplus, he explained, but there was no idea of upsetting the market by dumping.

After appointing two committees the conference adjourned until Wednesday. One committee will consider questions arising from tariff barriers and the other will discuss a project to establish an international advisory committee which would act as a permanent board in connection with any wheat agreement. Such a board probably would have headquarters in London.

A today's meeting the chief exporting countries submitted a draft of an agreement to the importers. The draft provided:

- 1.—That importers would not do anything to increase domestic production.
- 2.—That they would do everything possible to increase consumption.
- 3.—That substantial improvement in the price of wheat would be followed by tariff adjustment.
- 4.—That tariff reductions would be accompanied by modifications of the quota system which now limits imports into consuming countries.

Zane Grey Averts Blaze in Forest

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Prompt action yesterday on the part of Zane Grey, noted author and sportsman, averted a very serious forest fire. Grey, who is spending the summer at Steamboat station on the North Umpqua river, made an expedition yesterday to the Calapooia, west of Sutherlin, to fish for trout. He discovered a fire burning in the brush near the mouth of Coon creek, and walked several miles to the Hinkle creek ranger station where he reported the blaze. Fire fighters were sent out and brought the blaze under control, holding it to approximately one-fourth of an acre in size. Had the fire reached material size it would have threatened a large body of fine timber.

State Orders 1000 Yards Crushed Rock

An order for 1000 yards of crushed rock for maintenance of the old territorial road, which is a state secondary highway, has been placed by the state highway department with Lane county and the county's crusher on the Lorane highway near Gillespie Corners will be started up September 1, it was announced by P. M. Morse, county engineer, Monday. The rock will be used by the state in smoothing the surface of the road where it has become worn.

Four hundred or 500 yards of rock in addition for maintenance of county roads in that section of the county will also be crushed while the plant is in operation, the engineer said.

Prune Growers Set Wages For Pickers

ROSEBURG, Ore., Aug. 22.—(AP)—Prices to be paid laborers in the prune harvest will be largely dependent upon prices received by growers

for their fruit. It was agreed here at a meeting of representative growers. A tentative schedule, however, has been adopted, providing payment for pickers at the rate of three and one-half cents per box on Italian and date prunes, with a one-half cent bonus for pickers who remain throughout the season. Wages for pickers of petite prunes, which are of a smaller size, will be one cent higher with the same bonus provision. Minimum wages for common labor will be \$2 per day and for dryer men \$2.50 per day. The growers agreed that higher wages will be paid if the price for prunes justifies.
