TRAPS DESPERADO IN URSCHEL KIDNAP 'PRISON'



In the 'desolate shack' pictured above, near Paradise, Texas, federal agents trapped Harvey J. Bailey, alleged ringleader in the \$10,000 kidnaping of Charles F. Urschel, Oklahoma City oil millionaire, and four of Bailey's alleged accomplices. Urschel identified the shack as the one in which he was held prisoner; ransom money was found in Bailey's possession. Bailey also was a leader in the Memorial Day prison break at Kansas penitentiary and is accused of complicity in the Union station massacre in Kansas City in which four officers and a convict were killed. When agents surprised Bailey asleep he had hidden under his bedclothes the machine gun, automatic rifle, and pistols pictured below.
