Obituaries

Mrs. Harriet Phoenix FLORENCE, Aug. 23.—(Special)

—This community was greatly shocked and grieved to hear of the sudden death late Sunday afternoon of Mrs. Harriet Amelia Phoenix, one of Florence's oldest and most highly esteemed residents. She had made her home here the past eight years, coming from Kalispell, Montana, where her funeral and interment will occur and where she has resided for 20 years previous to her coast residence.

She was born near Ripon, Wisconsin, April 3, 1848, thus having entered her 85th year of age. She was intensely loyal and patriotic and proud of the fact that her father, John S. Ingersoll, was one of the first members of the republican party which had its birthplace in her native town, Ripon. Her father died in 1863 in a Missouri hospital, two years after his enlistment in the Union army. Her husband, John W. Phoenix, whom she wedded in 1869, was also a Civil war veteran who was left almost invalid and who died during their Kalispell residence.

One of her chief characteristics was her great love for the flag and during five years of service as patriotic instructor for the Woman's Relief corps, five flag raisings, three over district schools, were among her fondest memories. She held many offices in both the W. C. T. U. and the patriotic order, was an excellent reader and most active in all good work.

Of her five children, three sons remain. Ernie of Florence, Linn of Salem, Dell of Albany, and a grand daughter, Miss Birden Phoenix, whom she reared from babyhood and who has been her constant companion and helpmate.

Her body was taken to the Pooler-Gray-Bartholomew mortuary at Eugene that evening from where it was sent to her old home town.

Mrs. Emma Kirkham died at her home at 430 Thirteenth avenue west Tuesday afternoon following a very short illness. She was born on Jan. 4, 1861, in Athens, Ohio. In childhood she moved with her parents to Fairfield, Ia., and later to Jewel City, Kans., where in 1878 she married George B. Kirkham. They lived in Jewel City until 1900, when they went to Oklahoma for 20 years, and then came to Eugene. Mr. Kirkham died in 1932.

Mrs. Kirkham is survived by five children, Mrs. P. H. Paxton of Osburn, Kansas; Ben Kirkham of Freedom, Okla.; Harry Kirkham of East Orange, N. J.; Reta Kirkham of Ft. Worth, Tex.; and Miss Floy Kirkham, at home; and three grandchildren.

Mrs. Kirkham was an active member of the First Christian church, the Women's Relief corps, the Daughters of Union Veterans, and the W. C. T. U.

Funeral services will be held Friday at 3:30 at the Pooler-Gray-Bartholomew chapel in Eugene. Rev. S. E. Childers officiating. Mrs. E. M. Patterson and Paul Christian will sing. Interment will be in the new Odd Fellows cemetery.

James L. Page, former Eugene resident and postmaster, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Oscar Wahl, 2734 N. E. Wasco street, in Portland Tuesday evening. He was born on October 4, 1846, in Cleveland, Ohio, and at nine years of age moved to Portland.

In 1903 Mr. Page was nominated by President Theodore Roosevelt as postmaster at Eugene. He also spent 20 years in Eugene in the grocery business. He was a member of the Masonic, Modern Woodmen of the World, and Elks lodges, and served on the city council and the school board.

Mr. Page is survived by two children.

COUNTY BOUNDARY BOARD ACTS UPON SCHOOL PETITIONS

The petition to release a part of the Cloverdale school district from the Creswell union high school district recently created was allowed by the county boundary board Wednesday and an election to vote upon the question was ordered for September 14. The voting will take place at the high school building in Creswell and at the grade school building at Cloverdale.

All of the Cloverdale district was taken into the new Creswell union high district recently but that portion of the district which lies closer to the Pleasant Hill high school now seeks annexation to the latter.

The board at the session Wednesday appointed directors for the Creswell union high school district. A. F. Weber was named as temporary chairman and the other members named are E. F. Roberts from district No. 2, Mrs. Clara Benton of the Howe district, Riley Petty of the Bear creek district and E. E. Aallen of the Camas Swale district.

At their first regular meeting they will choose a chairman and elect a clerk.

The board accepted the petition to allow the Norton school district to become annexed to the Harrisburg union high school district if the people there are in favor of it and an election will be held in the near future.

The board authorized the payment of bills for transportation of non-high school district pupils to the different high schools that have handed in the bills prior to July 9 as provided by law. Several have

not done so although County Superintendent Moffitt had written the clerk of each of the high school districts a letter advising them to do so.

Payment was authorized to the high schools of Junction City, Mohawk, Crow, Pleasant Hill, Creswell, Cottage Grove, Oakridge, Springfield and Coburg.

Manager of Turkey Show is Selected

OAKLAND, Ore., Aug. 23.—(Special)—E. G. Young of this city was selected Tuesday as manager of the Northwestern turkey show to be held in Oakland December 18-21. Mr. Young is cashier of the E. G. Young and company bank and served as assistant manager of last year's show.

J. C. Leedy, who has been in charge of the Northwestern show since its establishment four years ago, was compelled to give up the work when he resigned as Douglas county agent to go to Portland as manager of the Oregon Turkey Growers.

The new county agent when he is chosen will be asked to serve as assistant manager while R. C. Kuehner, of Eugene, Lane county club agent, will fill a similar position. The new officials were named by the directors of the Northwestern Turkey Breeders association meeting here today.

Chaplain Riley Is Assigned Here

First Lieutenant Stanley Riley, chaplain's reserve, of San Francisco, arrived Wednesday at the Eugene CCO headquarters and will be stationed here to assist Chaplain Wm. V. Barney in the religious work of the district.

Chaplain Riley is a Catholic priest ordained three years ago and will devote his time to the Catholics in the Civilian Conservation Corps camps while Chaplain Barney will handle the protestant work.

C. C. C. BOYS VOTE TO STAY IN CAMP

CAMP KERBY, SELMA, Ore., Aug. 23.—(Special)—Now that the president has put his O. K. on another six months enlistment, the boys of 1746-C C. C. at Selma, decided to take a straw vote on whether or not they would re-enlist. The final vote for this camp was: Re-enlistment 172, non-re-enlistment 29, or about 86 per cent in favor of re-enlistment. Incidentally as some 15 Applegate C. C. Camps were the guests of the camp that night a vote was taken among them and the result showed 13 for and 2 against, which is about the same percentage.

However, there was much discussion among the boys before they
