

EASTERN TYPHOON TAKES TOLL OF 47 DEAD; LOSS HEAVY

Floods still imperilled parts of the East today as it counted at least 47 dead in the path of a runaway typhoon that raged up from the tropics and whirled away into the St. Lawrence valley.

A smashed dam and rising waters marooned 100 persons, mostly boys and girls, at Camp Achvach, Godfrey, N. Y., calls for assistance sent a rescue squad from the Port Jervis fire department to the scene, but the firemen found the camp in no danger.

At dawn today the Port Jervis police said that the waters of the Neversink river, which surrounded the camp, were receding. There was now no danger, they said, that a second dam which had been reported menaced would give way.

In Pennsylvania, one of the wind states to feel the fury of the wind and rain, hundreds of families fled their homes yesterday. Schools and hospitals were thrown open to care for refugees at York, Pa., estimates said 2,500 persons left their homes in and around Reading alone.

Property damage probably never will be known accurately. Some published estimates said \$10,000,000.

The Catskill mountain village of Fleischmanns, N. Y., menaced for a time by a weakened dam, was believed saved as waters of Lake Switzerland receded slowly. A New York priest, the Rev. James Hesley, drowned in trying to save five marooned persons at Mt. Tremper, N. Y.

Communication and transportation lines still were cut in several sections, making the task of checking the total casualties difficult. Virginia, which saw its famous resorts at Ocean View and Virginia Beach battered to wreckage, counted 11 dead and several missing. Property damage was set at three millions, at least.

heart-breaking task of attempting to control the worst forest conflagration in Oregon's history.

Extreme heat prevailed over the fire section today, blasting any hope the fire fighters had had that they might be aided by the elements in their uneven battle.

Forestry officials estimated the loss can thus far be computed in the millions of dollars.

Palmer's death was the first, although hundreds of the men on the fire lines have suffered burns and minor injuries. Palmer and his three companions were guarding a fire trail. Palmer was seated on the ground. With little warning a huge tree awayed, toppled with terrific velocity and crashed like thunder to the ground. Palmer could not move fast enough to escape. His standing companions barely did escape with their lives. The tree completely covered the Illinois youth.

Hours later other fire fighters recovered his body which was taken to Forest Grove.

Fire Approaches Tillamook
The gale-like winds from the east today drove the menacing Wilson river fire three miles nearer Tillamook, on the coast. It was still advancing on the south side of the river and was about 15 miles from Tillamook in the vicinity of Fall Creek.

The gale was of such terrific force that it tore fire needles and maple leaves loose in the woods and showed them, unburned, but mixed with ashes, over Tillamook streets and homes. The deposit of ashes this morning was so thick that footprints were left on the sidewalks just as though the covering had been snow.

Total darkness prevailed at Tillamook at 6 a. m. as the east wind blew the great pall of smoke over that region.

Wind Shrieks in Timber
Fire wardens said the flames were progressing both as crown and ground fires, with the wind shrieking as the tree tops exploded in flame.

paraging sales presentation dissuade purchase of the advertised article and substitute other merchandise on which a greater profit is realized.

No reference may be made in advertisements to competitors' prices, values, credit terms, policies of service. Advertisers also were forbidden to claim a continuing practice of "really understanding competitors' threat competition" in promoting sale of goods "At less than the cost delivered cost—plus the cost to insure that later costs will be at least partially covered."

However, this provision was qualified by permitting " bona fide seasonal clearances of merchandise of lines to be discontinued goods."

It would consist of representation of the president and two cabinet members, hardware, tool making, dry goods, shoe and hat stores.

The question of price marking of merchandise was left open for determination by the trade authorities.
