LEG AMPUTATED IN LOGGING ACCIDENT

Carol Langberry, of Leaburg, was seriously injured Thursday afternoon while working in the woods of the Booth-Kelly camp above Wendling. His leg was caught between two logs, mashing it so badly it was completely amputated. The accident happened about 2:30 and Mr. Langberry was carried a mile through the woods and then placed on a stretcher and brought to Wendling where he was met by an ambulance which rushed him to the Eugene hospital. He arrived here about 5:30 o'clock.

Although Mr. Langberry's condition is very serious he will recover, barring complications, according to the attending physician.
