Chicago Wheat Is Moderately Higher

CHICAGO, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Wheat moved moderately higher today in erratic and light trading. An early advance was induced by an upturn of about two cents a bushel more than was expected in Liverpool wheat prices. Liverpool strength was attributed to signing of the agreement at the London wheat conference, but this was passed by her without notice.

Corn was weaker, after a slight early advance, because of uncertainty. Outside markets were bidding as much as six cents a bushel higher than current cash prices in Chicago for corn. Oats and rye firmed with wheat.

Wheat closed firmer and 1/2 to 1 cent higher than yesterday's finish. Corn week, 1-8 to 3-8 down. Oats unchanged to 3-8 up, and provisions 10 cents lower to 8 cents advanced.

WEEKEND HOLIDAY DISPLAYS TRADERS IN GUESSING MOOD

NEW YORK, Aug. 23.—(AP)—Financial markets improved this week as the government pushed the NIRA drive and the federal reserve system pumped fresh funds into the credit reservoir. Markets were closed Saturday in accordance with the summer rule.

Plans for stimulating consumer buying, especially from blue eagle firms, went forward. Meanwhile, some lines of business gave further evidence of seasonal contraction, although the let-down continued leisurely.

The sudden revival of open market operations by the central banks, expressed in a \$35,000,000 purchase of government securities, found Wall street trying to read between the lines for glimpse of Washington's purposes. Whether it meant that actual currency inflation was to be held on its side track, or whether it was an answer to those who said commercial bank credit was inadequate were points open to conjecture.

Credit expansion through federal reserve channels has already created heavy excess reserves for member banks, the difficulty has been in finding work for these resources. In some quarters it is being said that current needs are for intermediate and long term rather than short term credit, and that the capital market, rather than the banks, is the logical source of such accommodations.

New bond issues have been very scarce, due partly to the public's speculative mood and partly, no doubt, to confusion resulting from the securities act.

The undertone of sentiment in Wall street remains against the possibilities of inflation. There have been reports that Washington would adopt more aggressive policies in this connection as a means of bolstering prices against seasonal sag; that it would use its powers to further the NRA's purposes. The stock market, particularly, seems impressed with the potentialities of the situation, though so far there has been no departure from orthodox methods of obtaining the end sought.

During the shortened week the standard statistics-Associated Press 90-stock composite rose 4.4 points to 89.6 compared with the July peak of 96.9. In Friday's lively rise several leaders reached new highs for the year.

PORTLAND, Aug. 23.—(AP)—There was a noticeable swing among some houses to purchase northern eggs in preference to those of Oregon.

Stocks of pullet eggs have been piling up in all quarters as a result of high comparative price.

Market for poultry was unchanged at the week-end insofar as live chickens were concerned. The opening of a trading on the produce exchange was without feature as to price, while open market values were stationary.

Demand for turkeys remained firm. All sorts were in call with very little offering at the week-end. Prices were nominal but at the extreme point of the season.

Situation in the butter trade appeared steady for the week-end session of the produce exchange. Cold storage stock was reported as coming out.

Very active trading tone continued at the week-end for peaches. Carloads of Californians were getting quite well cleaned up with brokers asking as much, if not more than current retail sales. Local canning varieties increasing and in call.

Produce trade continued to face a shortage of tomatoes. Consumption to date has been unusually heavy and the entire territory was reflecting very firm and even advancing prices on top quality.

At the week-end there was no change in the price on cantaloupes. Best Dillard stock continued up to \$1.25 cents with others \$1.10 to \$1.15 in a small way. Quality of supplies generally good.
