Joel McCrea as David Phelps, Laura Hope Crews as the mother, and many others give excellent characterizations.

"Prosperity," with Marie Dressler as a mother-in-law battling another mother-in-law in the person of Polly Moran is the laugh attraction opening Sunday at the State theatre.
