

PURSE THIEF IS CAUGHT AFTER RUN; DRUNK DRIVER UP

James Kelly, 24, of Fresno, Cal., was caught by state police Sunday afternoon after a lively chase through the streets and was locked up in the county jail, charged with the theft of two purses from a car parked on the street.

A woman saw Kelly take the purses from the car and waited until the owners arrived a few minutes later when she notified them of the theft. Soon afterward she recognized the man and called the state police who soon located him, but he saw them coming and ran. He was caught in the railroad yards in the vicinity of Fifth avenue east and Pearl street. Kelly appeared Monday in the justice court and was sentenced to serve 30 days on a charge of larceny.

George Oliver of Springfield was arrested Sunday in that city on a charge of driving a car while drunk and appeared before Justice Johnston Monday. He wanted more time to plead. Oliver was released only a short time ago after serving a sentence of 30 days and \$100 fine for the same offense.
