

OPINIONS ON SALES TAX DIVIDED; FEW OFFER ALTERNATIVE

Citizens of Eugene continued to register their opinions regarding the proposal to call a special session of the state legislature to consider the matter of a sales tax for unemployment relief and school benefit Tuesday.

Elmo Chase—I am still opposed to any proposal to put into effect a sales tax because it makes an unequitable burden of taxation and does not benefit the persons most in need of relief. I believe the people of the state still are of the same opinion as at the last election and I feel sure they would turn down the present proposition just as they did the last one. Therefore, it seems a waste of time and money to consider the idea at all.

Robert M. Fischer, Jr.—If the sales tax were so devised as to give indisputable relief to the unemployed, it would be acceptable, but I am afraid it would not. The unemployed individual, to receive any benefit, must have direct relief on articles he is concerned with, and so far there seems to be no evidence that this is being accomplished.

W. O. Swan of the Swan loan agency—I am for a sales tax because it would give everybody a chance to pay. There are thousands of persons in this state who are earning good salaries who have never paid a cent of taxes in their life. These persons should be taxed and a sales tax would be the means to that end.

Fred Gerot, restaurant proprietor—Enactment of a sales tax probably is the only thing that can be done under present circumstances but it should be only temporary. While I voted against the sales tax bill at the last election I have changed my mind and believe it would be a good thing now. It would afford an opportunity for everybody to share in the tax burden.

Judd Stauffer, prominent Spanish war veteran—The sales tax is the only thing. It is the only just and equitable tax. It ought to be enacted. Walter P. Fell, insurance dealer—I have always been highly in favor of a sales tax and I think the legislature should be called to pass such a law to meet the emergency. Fifty per cent of the people pay no tax at all. We've got to get "out of the hole" some way and this seems to be the only way out.

because of lack of business the situation is likely to be worse.

The commissioner said that from present indications Lane county will receive from the government R. F. C. funds during the months of October, November and December one-third the amount allotted for the present quarter, which was about \$300,000. Under the new setup wherein government money will be forthcoming only on a basis of \$1 for every \$2 raised locally, there appears to be no definite idea as to how the money can be raised in Lane county.

Miss Mary Annin, executive secretary of the Lane county chapter of the Red Cross, said that while there is nothing definite in the matter of raising funds locally she is optimistic and expressed the belief that they will be forthcoming from some source.

sufficient money to meet the payments.

It is to this latter class that the city is hoping to extend some form of relief through putting into effect time extensions on payments and refinancing the bonds covering this amount of assessments due.

The state legislature, at the last session, passed an act enabling those people in arrears on their assessment payments to obtain an extension of time, amounting to ten years, in which to pay their assessments and avoid foreclosure by the city.

However, in order to obtain this extension, it is necessary for each individual to show evidence that all back general taxes have been paid and that delinquent interest on assessments has been paid. Proving this, the individual may receive the ten years extension of time to pay up the assessments.

The city may then issue new bonds to cover the amount due in assessments, the refinancing thus placing the city in good financial standing in regard to its bond retirement program.

Just what the committee will decide on in this matter is of course unknown as yet, but it is thought that this plan will receive approval.

The city's program for retirement of Hancock bonds for the future is as follows: 1930, \$212,000; 1937, \$404,000; 1938, \$246,000; 1940, \$137,000; 1942, \$30,000.

If this method of deferred payments is made available and the city's bonds refunded, the credit of the city will remain in good standing, payment of general taxes will be aided through creating an incentive to pay them to obtain the deferred assessment payments and the general taxpayers will be relieved of a considerable burden that might be forced upon them through foreclosures, Mr. Bryson pointed out.

"If the city is forced to foreclose on property delinquent in assessment payments, the city must then sell this property for what it can get and the deficit in assessments must be made up through general taxation," he said.

The committee is expected to work out details of the plan in the near future for submission to the council at its next meeting.
