"TUGBOAT ANNIE" IS GREETED HERE BY RECORD HOUSE

The record "houses" which greeted the opening performances of "Tugboat Annie" at the McDonald Sunday attested the popularity of Marie Dressler and Wallace Beery, two really great and well-matched stars. The play also lived up to expectations.

It is one of those rough-and-ready romantic stories, plenty of homely humor and gruff sentiment. "Tugboat Annie" (none other than Marie, of course) is a character of the Puget Sound waterfront. She possesses a loveable but drunken husband (who could it be but Wally?) and an up and coming son, the pride of her heart.

The son, guided by his inspiring mother and admonished by the misfortunes of his wayward father, rises to be the skipper of a crack liner plying out of the Puget Sound ports. There comes the problem of "bringing up" his somewhat unrepresentable family and there are plenty of complications of the laughable and tearful sort.

There is a tremendous finish. The great "Glacier Queen" breaks a main shaft at sea and drifts toward the rocks. The old tug "Narcissus" drops her tow of garbage barges and wallows out to the rescue, leaky boiler and all.

Drunken Terry Brennan (Beery) does the heroic, crawling in over the firebox of the tug to repair the leaky tubes. Fadeout—a reunited and happy family. Tugboat Annie standing proudly between father and son, Terry wearing a hero's medal and a sling (which proves to be the hiding place of his usual flask).

"Tugboat Annie" is entertainment first class. Any show featuring Dressler and Beery is bound to be, let dramatic technicians argue with the plot as much as they want. Also the photography is superb.

Best shots are Puget Sound shipping against the background of snow-topped Olympics and the tremendous storm off the capes.

Another feature on the McDonald bill not to be overlooked is "Mickey Mouse's Opening Night." The caricatures of filmdom's favorite stars are real art.—W. M. T.

Chamber Directors Ask For Work Plan

At a special meeting of the directors of the chamber of commerce Monday noon, a resolution was adopted urging the city council to prepare and make public at the earliest possible date plans by which the city can participate in the federal public works program to create jobs.

Trunk sewers and a sewage disposal plant are the principal items in the proposed program for Eugene and City Engineer Clark has been at work on details for several weeks. The action of the chamber does not carry an endorsement of the projects but urges haste to get them in definite form so that opinions can be formed.

Approximately \$85,000 would be required for a sewage disposal plant and approximately \$70,000 addition for trunk sewers which will be needed even if a disposal plant is not built. The federal government would donate 50 per cent for the project and loan the rest at 4 per cent for 30 years.

City Attorney S. M. Calkins said that while a bond issue for the city's share would be impossible (due to present bonds in excess of 5 per cent of valuation) he believed the government would accept a plan whereby the loans would be paid off by a nominal charge against water connections. This would amount to approximately 80 cents a year per consumer.

DR. HARRIS NAMED TO 3RD WARD JOB ON CITY COUNCIL

Confirmed appointment of Dr. M. C. Harris as councilman from ward 3 to succeed Vern D. Scott, resigned on account of ill health.

Heard and referred to finance committee plan of Recorder Bryson for refinancing delinquent special assessments.

Revoked beer license of W. H. O'Hara on Park street on recommendation of police committee.

Granted beer license to Audley M. Reese, 748 Park street.

Postponed action on ordinance to permit pasteurization of milk outside city limits.

Declined to raise garbage collection fees.

Granted permit to Christian Church evangelists to use city lots at 9th and Polk for tent services for 60 days.

Received ordinance to require license for theatrical performances.

Dr. M. C. Harris, for many years chairman of the Republican central committee of Lane county, became a member of the Eugene city council from the third ward last night, by appointment to succeed Vern D. Scott, resigned on account of ill health.

Police Chief Carl Bergman was sent at once to the residence of Dr. Harris to fetch him to city hall and he was sworn in forthwith. He was appointed to serve on the committees of police, health and printing.

Action on the plan to permit pasteurization of milk outside the city limits was postponed after the council had heard argument for the plan by Attorney James K. King and J. G. Fish. It probably will come up again at the next meeting. The health board has suggested that the plan may be unwise and expensive.

The beer license of W. H. O'Hara on Park street was revoked on complaints of bad order. The police chief and the police committee recommended the action.

Audley M. Reese was granted a beer license at 748 Park street on his pledge to maintain order and permit no drunkenness.

A plan for the refinancing of delinquent special assessments was outlined by Recorder R. S. Bryson. On payment of delinquent taxes, property owners would be permitted to apply for a ten-year extension on delinquent assessments. These assessments would then be covered by bond issues at 5 per cent to replace 6 per cent obligations and interest warrants now outstanding. The finance committee was directed to put the plan in shape for action.

An ordinance proposing a \$25 license for theatrical houses and a rigid inspection of their safety provisions was read and referred to committee. The object is to prevent raids by itinerant and irresponsible show companies.

Routine and bills occupied much of the session.

Minor actions included: Permit to Eugene hospital to pave alley south of city hall, city to pay its share.

3-C request for lease on camp site in Riverview park laid over but continued use by 3-C authorized.

Requests for stop street at 8th and High and on W. 11th denied for lack of funds.

Request of Safeway stores for cancellation of beer permit and return of money denied.
