ST. LOUIS BATTLEGROUND FOR RESEARCH

"Sleeping Sickness" Still Taking Heavy Toll; Cause Mystery

MOSQUITO SUSPECTED

In Laboratories, Over Bogs, Medicos, Biologists Pursue Search

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 30.—(AP)—A climbing death toll today faced baffled medical men, organized here in a determined fight against the rapidly spreading epidemic of encephalitis, or sleeping sickness.

An additional death today—the 46th within a month—sent the ratio of fatalities among encephalitis victims here to one to six, or 14.2 per cent.

Research Is Pushed
Alarmed, leaders in the medical fraternity divided into many fields of research to seek some clue of the source of the epidemic.

While the number of victims increase daily, the nation's health experts from the United States department of public health are guiding a so far fruitless campaign against the malady.

Under the direction of Dr. J. P. Leake of the federal health bureau, scientists searched for a defense against the disease that has sent more than 330 persons to isolation wards, within the past 30 days.

Mosquito Again Suspected
The mosquito, suspected as a carrier of the encephalitis germ, was under the scrutiny of Dr. L. L. Williams, Jr., of the nation's health bureau, in the laboratories of Washington university.

Other scientists waded through swampy lowland sections in search of a clue to aid in the valiant battle.

Colder weather which settled over the area during the night and accompanied by rain, may aid the health experts. Some scientists believe open sewers, stagnated by low rainfall and located in the midst of the affected area, may be the source of the epidemic.

Heavy rains to flood the sewers and colder weather to eliminate the biggest influx of mosquitoes which the encephalitis affected area has experienced in many years, were needed, health experts said.

75 Men Will Be Put to Work On McKenzie Highway

Seventy-five men will be employed on the job of surfacing the McKenzie highway between Doyle Hill and Nimrod, according to V. L. Moffett, representative of Babler Bros., of Portland, who have the oil macadam contract on this section. Mr. Moffett was here to confer with Frank L. Armitage, in charge of the United States employment office, regarding labor to be placed on this job. It is expected that operations will be started about Sept. 5, Mr. Moffett said.

More than one-half of the number of men required on this job will be skilled workmen and the contractors will need approximately 30 heavy and light truck drivers, motor grader operators, gasoline rollersmen, and gas shovel operators. These men must be thoroughly experienced in the work, it was stated.

A number of trucks will be used, among them being one and a half ton trucks with hoist and three or four ton and a half ton trucks without dump or box to rig up for oil tanks.

Burly Long Island Policeman Is Hailed As Hero Of Battle With Huey Long; Denies Glory

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Aug. 30.—(AP)—The Brooklyn Eagle says today it has learned from an authoritative source that the man who smacked Senator Huey Long at a Long Island party Saturday night is Chief of Police Steve Webber of Port Washington, a former boxer and army drill sergeant.

Chief Webber, a man of more than 200 pounds who stands six feet one in his stocking feet, has a local reputation as a skilled boxer and trainer of amateur boxers. He smiled but denied the glory of "kayaking" the Louisiana senator.

Since the fight, concerning which the utmost secrecy was maintained by members of the club and guests at the charity function to which Senator Long was invited, there has been continual speculation as to the identity of the man who laid the southern senator low.

Chief Webber was said to have shown little surprise when he was told the spotlight of curiosity had swung upon him but he insisted that his denial be used if a story was carried. He grinned as he made this statement.

In Milwaukee, where Senator Long had gone before news of the fracas leaked out, Long issued a statement in which he said that he had been "ganged" in the club washroom by about four men, one of whom wielded a knife "or something sharp."

The version gradually leaking out from club members and guests, however, was that Long had offended a man in the washroom and that that man, without any aid, had knocked the senator down. One club member said he saw Long rush from the washroom with both hands over his face and with blood streaming down his shirt front. Friends placed him in a taxi and took him to his New York hotel where he was given medical attention for a two inch cut over one eye.

Senator Long left his baggage at his hotel when he went to Milwaukee and informed the hotel he would return. He was expected today but this morning the hotel received a telegram from him saying he was on his way to New York and that his baggage was to be sent to him there.

Bert Nevins, a press agent, announced today he had sent Senator Long a telegram offering him \$1000 a day to appear at Coney Island side-show. The telegram follows:

"You have made yourself the greatest attraction in America. Have been authorized to offer you \$1000 nightly to appear as a freak attraction at Coney Island. Wire acceptance or rejection immediately."

Argentine Signs Wheat Agreement

LONDON, Aug. 30.—(AP)—Thomas Le Breton, Argentine representative here, today signed an international agreement designed to raise wheat prices and brought to 22 the number of signatories.

Frederick E. Murphy of Minneapolis represented the United States at the brief ceremony at which Le Breton added his name to the accord. Also present were delegates from the other two major wheat exporting countries, Canada and Australia.

FORD ON SPOT IN NRA QUERY BY ROOSEVELT

President Asks for Report On Situation; Offers No Threats

FORD REMAINS "MUM"

Rumors Hint of Plan to Go NRA "One Better" But Silence Reigns

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Aug. 30.—(AP)—President Roosevelt has asked General Hugh S. Johnson, industrial administrator, for a report on the failure of Henry Ford to enroll under the new working agreement for the automobile industry.

Mr. Roosevelt wants the latest news on this before he departs tomorrow for a vacation cruise back to Washington and there is indication he is considering action, although the president is saying nothing about that and making no threats.

Licensing Not Considered Yet
In talking with General Johnson it was stated no word had been received at Washington so far from the Michigan auto maker. Inquiries here about the use of the drastic licensing power to impose the N. E. working code on Ford brought the answer that no detailed consideration has been given so far to this piece of authority.

Getting ready for a few days at sea on his return to the capital, the president expects to announce the members of the oil planning and conservation committee to work with Secretary Ickes, the oil administrator, in covering this industry under its new working code. Fourteen other members are to be chosen.

It was stated today at the summer white house that there was no significance in the fact the modification of the gold embargo followed by just a day the visit of Montagu Norman, governor of the Bank of England, and George L. Harrison, governor of the federal reserve bank of New York.

Washington Goes Wet By Big Vote; One District Dry

SEATTLE, Aug. 30.—Repealists were safely past the 24th milestone in their drive toward elimination of the prohibition amendment from the federal constitution today, with Washington joining the wet parade by a smashing majority in Tuesday's election.

Only one legislative district, the 6th, in rural Eastern Washington, was in the dry column on the basis of available returns. The district will have only two of the 99 delegates who will meet October 3 at state capital in Olympia to ratify formally the decision reached by the voters at the polls yesterday.

The popular vote from 1,042 of the state's 2,082 precincts rolled up a total of 316,064 wet ballots to 132,350 cast for dry candidates. The statewide total, however, had no bearing on the outcome, as delegates were chosen by legislative districts, a provision which wet leaders bitterly attacked during the campaign.

GILL TO PROPOSE BONDS AS MONEY

Grangers Also to Advocate Giving State Power to Collect Taxes

SALEM, Ore., Aug. 30.—(AP)—Small, short term bonds backed by property taxes now delinquent will be proposed as a solution of Oregon's relief problems by Ray W. Gill, master of the Oregon state grange, it was learned at the capital today.

The plan, worked out at Portland by a group of legislators and state grange leaders, would authorize the state to take over collection of all delinquent county taxes. Bonds to the value of one-fourth of delinquencies would be issued in denominations as low as five dollars. These would be issued to counties and would serve as legal tender, being used for relief purposes and also for support of schools.

Delinquent taxes in Oregon total about \$40,000,000, the state tax commission reports. It was suggested at the meeting funds to start the plan in operation immediately might be borrowed from the state highway commission.

Issuance of the small bonds, it was claimed by grange leaders, would in no way impair the credit of the state, since they would be retired when delinquent taxes are collected. Since they will be guaranteed by the state, they will be sold at a premium.

The topic was selected especially on the suggestion of a contributor that it would be helpful to have on hand a few suggestions in preparing last minute meals when guests drop in unexpectedly; the idea being to make up a menu from materials you have at hand.

Today are published the last two of last week's winning entries on uses of peaches as follows:

Macaroon Ice Cream With Peaches
Two cups milk. 1 egg. 1/4 cup

sugar. 1 cup macaroon crumbs. 1 cup peach pulp. 1 cup cream.

Scald the milk, beat the egg, add sugar, and add to the scalded milk. Cook in a double boiler until thickened, stirring constantly. Add macaroon crumbs. Cool, and add the peach pulp (made by mashing fresh or canned peaches) and the cream, whipped until stiff. Turn into a freezer. Serves ten.—Mrs. Edith Hurd, Creswell, R. I.

Peach Custard Tarts
Four to 6 ripe free stone peaches. (Depends on size). 2 eggs. 1/4 cup sugar. 3 tablespoons water. Butter size of walnut. 1/4 teaspoonful any desired flavoring—or a dash of cinnamon or nutmeg.

Peel and slice peaches. Sprinkle with 2 tablespoons of sugar and set to chill. Beat eggs, add balance of sugar and water and butter—cook in double boiler till done—stirring frequently. Add flavoring when almost cool—put a layer of sliced peaches in tart shell—a layer of custard another layer of peaches—top with whipped cream and serve.—Mrs. E. M. White, Crow Stage, Eugene.

FOREST CLOSURE ORDER IS LIFTED

PORTLAND, Ore., Aug. 30.—(AP)—The executive order closing the forests of Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook, Washington and Yamhill counties was lifted today by Governor Meier. The forest areas were closed last week because of fire hazard.

While gentle rains beat over the lifeless woods and sprinkled on the hot ashes left by the most disastrous forest fires in Oregon within man's memory, timber cruisers entered the blackened area today to count the tremendous loss from the flames.

Thousands of acres of forest lands were devastated by the thundering, blasting fires which whipped over northwestern Oregon for two weeks. Louis F. Cronmiller, state forester, said today the loss might amount to as much as \$42,000,000. Others said \$30,000,000 might cover the damage. Between ten and 14 billion feet of yellow fir timber was destroyed as the flames ravaged the giant trees.
