The Waldorf Paint store received a letter from the Pittsburgh Plate Glass company, paint and varnish division, Thursday, that the firm had signed in accordance with President Roosevelt's appeal, the re-employment agreement as approved by the National Recovery administration, pending the approval of the code of fair competition for the paint, varnish and lacquer industry submitted August 1. The firm announces that effective August 1, the factories of the firm have been operated to conform with the agreement and is entitled to carry the Blue Eagle.

Mrs. Swank is survived by her widower, a brother and a sister living in Nebraska.

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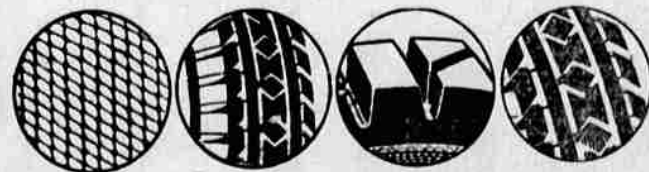
