row at Seven," Thursday and Friday attraction at the Heilig theater, Frank McHugh and Allen Jenkins play the roles of two superbly morose detectives, and bid fair to join Wheeler and Woolsey and Laurel and Hardy as among the great comedy teams of the screen. Chester Morris has the lead as a young novelist, with Vivienne Osborne portraying the daughter of an old man threatened by the "Black Ace," who always advertises

his murders and commits them on schedule. Henry Stephenson is excellent as the millionaire who bends every effort to effect the murderers' capture. It's good entertainment.

"Tugboat Annie," the thrilling comedy-drama of life on Puget Sound tugboats in which Wallace Beery and Marie Dressler are co-started closes Friday at the McDonald theater. Miss Dressler portrays "Annie," feminine captain of the "Narcissus," a battered 40 year old tug, while Beery is seen as her useless but lovable husband, Captain Terry, who has a weakness for hair-cream, lemon extracts, or anything else containing alcohol. An excellent supporting cast is featured, with Robert Young and Maureen O'Sullivan in the romantic leads.

"The Devil Is Driving," melodramatic story of a wise-cracking garage mechanic, played by Edmund Lowe, closes Thursday at the State theater. Wynne Gibson plays opposite Lowe, as the gunman's moll who falls for him only to be turned down. The story deals with an auto-stealing racket, with the thieves headquarters in the garage. Cars are stolen, repainted and rebuilt, then sold. Jimmy Gleason has the role of the owner, an unwilling accomplice of the mobsters, while Lois Wilson has a pathetic role as his wife. Little Dickie Moore is his son, who brings things to a head when one of the gangster's "hot cars" mows him down.

"She Had to Say Yes" because that was what she was hired for! As the customer's girl of a large business firm, Loretta Young's job is to entertain out-of-town buyers while they are completing deals with her company. Could a good girl stay that way under these circumstances? Come down to the Rex theater today and find out. Opposite Miss Young is Lyle Talbot, while Regis Toomey and Winnie Lightner are also in the cast. Incidentally, that's good news for a host of movie fans. Remember Winnie in the old musicals? She's on the comeback trail, and she's got a lot of what it takes.

Will Rogers, long a favorite of American audiences, was never more perfectly cast than in "Too Busy to Work," story of a tramp named Jubilo, which shows as part of a double bill at the Colonial Thursday. Will whistles "Jubilo" throughout, and gives his usual delightful characterization. There is a strong supporting cast. George Raft in "Pick-Up" completes the bill. It is an appealing story of an accidental meeting, from which a great deal developed. Little Sylvia Sydney plays opposite the suave and polished hero of many a gangster role, and both of them turn in excellent performances.
