

EUGENE SEWAGE IS FOUND TO BE WEAK

A report on the bio-chemical oxygen demand of Eugene sewage, indicating that sewage dumped into the Willamette river from this city is relatively weak, was received by the city engineer Friday from F. Merryfield, assistant professor of civil engineering at Oregon State college, who made the test from samples submitted by W. C. Clubb, city engineer.

The bio-chemical oxygen demand report indicates the amount of oxygen it would be necessary to inject into the sewage in order to break it down and keep the stream pure.

The report, showing the relatively little oxygen would be needed, indicates that Eugene is not seriously polluting the river by dumping the sewage into the stream. Clubb pointed out.

The report said that in order to completely break up the sewage, it would be necessary to introduce 122 pounds of oxygen to one million pounds of sewage in five days, 102 pounds in ten days and 180 pounds in 20 days. This means, that after the first introduction of oxygen, only slight amounts would be needed in each five-day period succeeding till the sewage was broken down completely.

Eugene dumps approximately three and one half million gallons of sewage into the river daily, or approximately 24 million pounds of sewage daily.

The report said sewage from Eugene was considerably weaker than the sewage emptied into the river by Corvallis, although Corvallis does not dump in as much as Eugene does.

wealth and property. Although details were not available, it was believed increased taxes on larger incomes, or increased scope of income taxes was contemplated in connection with this idea.

Other groups were back of a modified sales tax, differing from the sales tax defeated in the July election in that it would be imposed for the specific purpose of relief and for lifting the grade schools out of their present precarious plight.

The Taxpayers' League of Portland wants an income tax to abolish tax on real property, and C. A. Huntington of Eugene, member of the last legislature, is urging a graduated gross income tax on salaries, wages and businesses.

Scrambled eggs on French toast. Shred cucumbers, tomatoes, and onion.

Dutch cheese with fresh wild blackberry jelly.

My "Emergency Menu" was as follows:

Potato soufflé.

Bread scappie.

Salad of Dutch cheese ring filled with diced cucumbers, tomatoes, and onions.

Sour cream biscuits with fresh wild blackberry jelly.

Cold tea combined with lemonade.

The necessary recipes are:

Potato soufflé—2 cups diced cold potatoes, 2 eggs beaten, 2 cups milk, plenty of salt and pepper. Bake in moderate oven 25 minutes or until custard is "set." Grated cheese improves this if you have it on hand.

Bread scappie—Brown a cupful of stale bread crumbs in butter, add eggs and milk as for plain scrambled eggs and stir with fork until done.

Sour cream biscuits—4 cups flour sifted with 1 teaspoon salt, one-half teaspoon soda, 2 teaspoons baking powder. Add one cup sour cream and enough milk to make the dough of the right consistency. These should be rolled thicker than ordinary biscuits as the cream makes them very tender.—Mrs. Lyle Taylor, Creswell, Route No. 1.

adopted by boards are outlined in brief as follows:

1. Purchase of supplies and equipment to be made from merchants and manufacturers enrolled in the NRA.

2. If any teacher or employee is now receiving a wage below the minimum fixed by the president's re-employment agreement, such wage is to be increased to meet the provisions of the agreement.

3. Reductions (if any) in salaries as a result of adverse economic conditions are regarded as temporary expedients and the salary schedule which prevailed before reduction is to be restored. If funds are not available for this purpose, plans for returning to the earlier salary schedule at the earliest practical moment will be made.

4. Additions to present staffs as required for the efficient operation of the schools to be made at points recommended by the responsible school officer and approved by the board. This step is to be taken in order to increase employment among the many qualified but unemployed workers in the schools.

5. Boards are urged and directed to make the facilities of the schools available for further education of all youths and adults who can profit by such opportunities. This is to lessen

Monthly Report Of Library Given

The monthly report from the city library shows that a total of 7070 books went into circulation during the month of August. Of this number, 5010 were for adults and 1460 for children.

The adult total showed 4588 fiction and 1022 non-fiction, and the children's number showed 923 fiction and 372 non-fiction.

The average circulation was 262 with the largest day seeing 417 books going out and the smallest, 134 books. Several new books have come in at the library.

ed legislation within a few months. Baltimore would operate under a license board with each county elsewhere in the state exercising its own option.

New York—Under a temporary law passed at the recent session of the legislature, the state beer control board would be given control of liquor pending enactment of permanent legislation next winter. A license scale is fixed including the following levies. Liquor \$1 a gallon, sparkling wine 40 cents a gallon; still wines 10 cents a gallon; distillers \$15,000 a year; wine manufacturers, \$500; wholesale liquor dealers, \$4,500; wholesale wine dealers, \$500; retailers in cities of more than 100,000 population, \$1,500 for consumption on the premises and \$1,200 for consumption off the premises; in cities of less than 100,000 population, fees would be \$1,200 for consumption on premises and \$1,000 where consumption on premises was not permitted.
